

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WASHINGTON NEWS AND GOSSIP.

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GEN. GRANT and Mrs. Grant will return here to-morrow morning from Connecticut.

GEN. BUTLER returned here this morning from Connecticut, and occupied his seat in the House this morning.

THE U. S. STEAMER PLYMOUTH will leave New York, about the latter part of next week, to rejoin the squadron in the Mediterranean.

MASTER RICHARDSON CLOVER has been detached from signal duty at Washington, and ordered to the Michigan on the 1st inst.

GEN. GARFIELD was to-day unanimously re-nominated to represent the nineteenth district of Ohio in the next Congress by the republican convention which met at Garrettsville.

WE UNDERSTAND that the following appointments have been made in the new Police Court: Justice D. R. Smith, to be Clerk; Justice O. B. Wall, Deputy; L. F. Clements and J. Thomas, Bailiffs; and H. Barton, Messenger.

ADJUTANT GENERAL TOWNSEND, U. S. A., is absent from the city on leave to visit his home in Massachusetts. He will return here on the 12th inst. Assistant Adjutant General Vincent is discharging the duties of the office during the absence of General Townsend.

THE ARCTIC EXPEDITION.—The conference committee on the bill making an appropriation of one hundred thousand dollars to aid in fitting out an expedition of discovery to the Arctic regions, agreed yesterday to make the amount fifty thousand dollars. The bill allows the President to select the commanders of the expedition, and authorizes the Secretary of the Navy to detail two vessels for its use.

THE APPROPRIATION BILLS.—There is some discussion as to whether the Senate will get through with all necessary legislation before the 10th inst., the time fixed for adjournment. It appears that the appropriation bills are well advanced, and are in a much better condition than is generally supposed, there being but four in the Senate not acted upon: all of which can be disposed of within two or three days, if no such obstacle is made over the way as is going on over the River and Harbor bill to-day.

DEFICIENCY APPROPRIATION BILL.—In the House this morning Mr. Dawes, from the Committee on Appropriations, reported a bill making appropriations to pay deficiencies for the year ending June 30, 1870. The bill appropriates about \$1,700,000, of which \$1,700,000 of the Department of Justice recently created. The other appropriations are for paying the codifiers of the laws of the United States, salaries of members of Territorial Legislatures, and various smaller items.

MONSIEUR PIERROT PARADO, the newly appointed Minister to Washington from the French Republic, who is exceedingly popular among the American residents of Paris, will be accompanied by his daughter, a very young girl. The young lady is exceedingly engaging. The lad is to go to school in the United States. Mons. Paradol speaks and writes English fluently. He is a widower, and a Paris correspondent prophesies "that he will espouse an American girl, if only from the reason that the Ambassador has been a bachelor, and that Yankee girls are so attractive."

THE RECENT NOMINATIONS of Collector, Sub-Treasurer, Naval Officer, and United States Marshal for the District of Columbia, have not yet been referred to the proper committee in the Senate, but will be at the first executive session. There is a good deal of speculation yet as to the result of the case of Mr. Murphy, nominated Collector. Both the friends and the enemies of this gentleman are equally sanguine. The fact that this is an administrative appointment gives it strength, and will undoubtedly have considerable weight with Senators.

THE INVESTIGATION OF THE CURRENCY BILL.—The committee appointed by the Secretary of the Treasury to examine into the management and verify the accounts of the Bank of America, and the Printing and Engraving establishment, have reported to the House, showing that there are of U. S. legal tender notes, fractional currency, and second series, registered bonds, gold notes and national currency charged to the bureau, \$96,446,501; credited, \$81,264,702; balance on hand verified by count of committee, \$15,181,799.

THE CAPITOL PRISONER, PAT. WOODS.—The House, this afternoon at 2 o'clock, took up the case of Patrick Woods, charged with assaulting a member of the House, in Richmond, on the 30th of May last, and proceeded to the confirmation of the majority of the committee and a resolution sentencing him to be imprisoned for three months in the jail of this District, and the report of the majority of the committee and their resolution directing that Woods be returned to the Hastings Court in Richmond, to be confined according to law. Judge Bingham had the floor, and advocated the passage of the resolution of the majority of the committee.

A PROTEST numerously signed by the members of the Washington bar, without distinction of party, was yesterday presented to the Senate Judiciary Committee against the confirmation of Jno. M. Oliver, recently nominated to be Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of this District.

The protest sets forth a want on the part of a nominee of the requisite legal qualifications for an eminent discharge of the duties devolving upon that branch of the court, and that the new judge will preside, and while disclaiming any opposition to Mr. Oliver on any grounds affecting his personal character or integrity, they respectfully set forth that, so far as the signers can ascertain, he has never studied law regularly, either under a preceptor or as student of law, and that he has not been admitted to practice by any court.

THE DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN THIS FALL.—The Congressional Democratic Executive Committee have selected a resident Committee to sit during the recess of Congress, composed of the following gentlemen: Jno. Richard, Gen. Merriam, chairman; Gen. Noah L. Jefferson, Gen. Denver and Thomas M. Smith. The committee will make active preparations in a short time for an efficient discharge of the duties devolving upon them. Members of the National Committee will co-operate with them in the several States and at the headquarters here. The Democrats in Congress and elsewhere are making preparations for starting a party newspaper in Washington, the first number to be issued on the 1st of September. James S. Harvey, ex-minister to Portugal, is reported as one of the editors.

THE STEAMER HOLATA, which arrived at New York yesterday, passed on the 28th of June the miniature steamer City of Baguay, from Liverpool, bound to New York.

THE BIDS FOR GOVERNMENT GOLD TO-DAY. NEW YORK, July 6.—There were fifteen bids for gold to-day, and the total amount was fifty-five thousand. The highest bid was 111 1/2-100 and the lowest 110 1/2-100. The awards will be \$1,000,000 on 111 1/2-100 to 111 1/2-100.

KILLED BY A BURGlar. NEW HAVEN, Conn., July 6.—Nathaniel Fenn, a prominent citizen of Milford, was shot and instantly killed in his house by a burglar, at about half-past two o'clock this morning.

THE PRESIDENT IN NEW YORK. NEW YORK, July 6.—President Grant arrived in New York in the New London boat at 6.30 a. m. He was sleeping at the Fifth Avenue Hotel. He is very much fatigued, and at once fell asleep upon his 14th of July jacket in Connecticut. He is accompanied from Connecticut by Senator Buckingham, ex-Governor Cleveland, and other distinguished friends.

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CONTESTED ELECTIONS. THE HOUSE WONT VOTE BY MACHINERY.

SENATE.—Mr. Sumner presented a memorial from colored citizens of Memphis, Tenn., asking Congress to incorporate them under the name of the American Lincoln Association. Mr. Pratt called up a bill for relief of United States and Brazil Steam Navigation Company.

Mr. Schurz, from Committee on Territories, reported, with amendments, House bill to constitute and amend certain acts of the Territorial Legislature of New Mexico.

Mr. Lewis asked to take up bill to authorize the corporate authorities of Washington to enlarge the territory of the city, and to incorporate the contemplated Southern Transcontinental Railway Company, under the name of the American Lincoln Association.

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
