The public will watch with no little solicitude to see how it is affected by the consolidation of the different telephone interests and the passing of the whole of that important and fast growing business in the United States into the hands of a single corporation. Having control of all the patents, and being without competition in any portion of the field, the new company ought to and doubtless will be able to give better and more satisfactory service than has been furnished hitherto, and for less money. Whether that will be the result or not remains to be seen. Many persons in Washington and elsewhere have been quick to avail themselves of the advantages offered by the new invention because they regarded the yearly rental charged for an instrument as excessive in itself and of all proportion to either the cost of the plant and service or its real value as a time and labor saving device as applied to the ordinary affairs of every day life. If the new organization is wise, therefore, it will put its rates so low that no business man can afford to be without an instrument at his residence as well as at his place of business. By adopting this wise course the telephone will become a still more general utility than it is now, which will in a little while grow into a necessity, but the company will be made one of the most profitable concerns in the country. If, on the other hand, its managers fall into the mistake of raising the price, or even keeping it at the old figure, they will place themselves in the exact attitude occupied by the footlights in the fable who killed the goose that laid golden eggs. The telephone is peculiarly an invention which will be profitable to its owners in the exact proportion that it is popularized, and it can only come into universal use by being kept cheap.

It looks now as though New York might not have an Egyptian obelisk, after all. The New York papers have a dispatch from London dated yesterday, to the effect that the so-called Cleopatra's Needle, at Alexandria, while being removed for shipment to the United States was seized by creditors of the Egyptian government.

Among the southern papers that have declared for Bayard as the next democratic presidential candidate are the Nashville American, New Orleans Times, Charleston News and Courier, Columbia S. C. Register, Austin (Texas) Statesman, Little Rock Democrat, Norfolk Virginian, Norfolk News, Raleigh News and Observer, Senators Lamar, Benn Hill, Hiram Johnson, Jones of Florida, Ransom, and Gordon are also for Bayard, and all of them combined ought to be able to start a pretty good "boom" for him in the South.

Last year the republican campaign of Massachusetts had a thorough canvass of voters made before the election and the result thus arrived at turned out to be remarkably accurate. This year the same sort of ante-election canvass is being made and up to the present it has covered half the State. The report from 117 towns indicates a majority of 100 against the republican ticket, and in a majority of the towns not yet canvassed last year returned a plurality of 15,000 for Taft. This very effectively disposes of Gen. Butler's "prospect" of election and shows that he is doomed to even a worse defeat than last year. The canvassing agents report that they are falling off in the Butler vote this year. Many democrats who supported him then will vote their own party ticket this time. The election of the republican ticket cannot yet be estimated. Democrats who voted for Taft last year will support Adams in coming election because of the national contest next year.

Mrs. Meeker is reported as saying that her husband (the lately murdered Indian agent) saw during the summer that trouble was brewing at the agency, and confessed to her that he was going to the States to help in civilizing the Indians by the aid of a tariff. This is testimony worth heeding in support of the policy which Secretary Schurz wishes to enforce with regard to the Indians. Instead of seeking to drive them to the pivot at the point of a bayonet he prefers to show them, by humane and constant example, that it is better to be civilized than to be exterminated. If they are to be exterminated, then the bayonet policy will more readily accomplish it, but in the process of extermination a great deal of white blood is shed.

Pennsylvania politicians of all parties have stood together heretofore, and, in fact, do now, in favor of protection, no matter how widely they differ upon other subjects. It is not improbable that they may divide very soon upon this issue, and should this occur, it is apparent that the democrats will be the free-traders, while the republicans will continue to fight for protection. The republican papers of that state are already giving prominence to the tariff question, and anticipation that they will be falling off in the country very soon. The line of argument adopted by these journalists, as a rule, extremely partisan, and that, as a matter of course, will perpetuate the party line very distinctly, and democrats cannot ignore it. The free-trade issue will be brought before the country, no doubt, this year, and the democrats of Pennsylvania will be forced by the government to take a definite position on the question. In the New England states certain journals of both parties are insisting upon a revision or modification of the tariff, and should it be made a party question, it may figure very conspicuously in the campaign next year.

It is hard to see how the shooting of Steel, the young Washingtonian, at Martinsburg, last Friday night—the particulars of which were given in Monday's Star—can be regarded as anything else than a very serious matter to the persons engaged in it, and particularly to the one who fired the shot which may prove fatal, even though they may be able to prove that no harm was intended. The shooting of a double-barreled shot-gun at an unoffending person, even in fun, is a style of amusement that no one has a right to engage in, and if any injury results from it the offender ought to be held responsible therefor just as much as though he meant mischief. Society needs to be protected as much from fools as from criminals, and the way to secure that protection is to make an example of some of the fellows who are indulging in the kind of shooting surrounding it, is left in trust to his executors and their successors for residents of the borough, or within five miles, who wish to use it.
