Result of Eight Hours' Work of the Committee on Resolutions. CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 15.—After a session which commenced at 10 last night and lasted with slight interruption until six o'clock this morning, the committee on resolutions evolved both a majority and minority report. They are as follows:

THE MAJORITY REPORT. The democracy of Ohio, in convention assembled, hereby resolve: That we most heartily indorse the honesty and economy of the administration of Gov. Joe. E. Campbell and commend the sixty-ninth general assembly for its fidelity to the principles of economy and reform, and especially for having provided for a secret ballot, by which every voter in Ohio can cast his ballot on the secret as he desires and have his vote counted as cast, and we invite attention to the fact that the republican party, though hypocritically professing to favor the secret ballot, yet opposed and voted against the bill for providing for a free and secret ballot, thus demonstrating its unfitness to be entrusted with the administration of county officers.

CONVENTION HALL, CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 15. The beautiful music hall of the forest city looked like a veritable fairy grotto today. Red, white and blue banners in fantastic designs developed and decorated the rafters of the balconies until not an inch of cornice was visible; the platform was banked with tiers of majestic palms and noble chrysanthemums, and the floor was carpeted with flowers. The air was fragrant with the perfume of the flowers, and the music of the organ and the voices of the delegates filled the hall with a sweet and harmonious sound.

THE OHIO DEMOCRAT. The speaker continued at length to discuss the merits of the new election law, and in conclusion he said: "Thanks to our democratic legislature, they cannot again duplicate this iniquity in Ohio, for that legislature passed an election law under which fraud and intimidation can no longer be used to corrupt and pervert the freedom of the ballot. The democrats see that this law is enforced in every voting precinct in the state. It is enforced in the future, for upon its maintenance not only does the success of your party depend, but the integrity of your institutions. Intrenched monopoly will not surrender without a desperate struggle; therefore I implore every man in this convention to vote after he leaves the platform with a clean conscience. Let no personal differences or feelings of disappointment in any way deter you, but be diligent, be active, be alert; organize in every district, in every town, in every village, let there be no dozing upon the issue; this is no time for the faint-hearted, but a time when the brave men and women who are willing to fight with their whole power for what they know to be right."

THE ASSEMBLING THOUSANDS. Half-past ten was the hour named in the official call for the gathering to be called to order, but as early as 8 the crowd outside of the structure made the thoroughfare impassable, and when the doors were thrown open it seemed that the freedom of the ballot was more than well secured. The crowd was estimated at 5,000 or 6,000, and the platform was completely covered by the delegates and the friends of the party. The air was filled with the sound of the organ and the voices of the delegates, and the scene was one of the most impressive ever witnessed in this city.
