Unveiling a Monument to Henry W. Grady at Atlanta.

POLITICAL PROSPECTS IN OHIO. Hearing in the Searies Will Case Resumed.

FIERCE GALES ON THE OCEAN. HONOR TO THE FREEMARKER.

Unveiling a Monument to Henry W. Grady—Gov. Hill's Orator.

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 21.—The monument erected in memory of Henry W. Grady on one of the principal streets of Atlanta was unveiled today in the presence of the governor of New York, the governor of Georgia and a large assemblage of southern people.

Miss Gussie Grady, the only daughter of Henry W. Grady, drew the cord which held the canvas in place about the figure on the monument.

When the noise had in part subsided, J. W. Lee was introduced to deliver the invocation. At his conclusion Hon. Fulton Colville read a statement prepared by the monument committee, giving a brief history of the movement for the erection of the monument.

It showed that almost every state in the Union had subscribed to the fund and that the necessary amount had been raised within thirty days after Grady's death.

The Mexican band rendered another selection and then Clark Howell, the orator of the occasion, David B. Hill, governor of New York, and the most enthusiastic greeting from the assemblage.

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MR. A. B. ROESSLER'S DEATH.

Testimony Taken Before the Coroner's Jury Today—The Accident Described. The body of Mr. A. B. Roessler, the mining engineer who was found dead in his room yesterday morning, after being knocked down by a horse and buggy driven by an unknown man, was kept in the morgue last night, and this morning Deputy Coroner Scheffer made a post mortem examination and found that death resulted from cerebral hemorrhage. A bruise was found on the back of the head, but there was no fracture. This morning at 11 o'clock Coroner Patterson held an inquest at the sixth precinct station.

TESTIMONY AT THE INQUEST. Mr. George A. Hyde, who said he had known the deceased for six weeks was the first witness called and he said he learned that he was the United States surveyor for the state of Texas. Witness found Roessler here without funds and he (witness) took his minerals out of stock and turned an office on No. 627 street. He offered to provide him with a room and board in addition to the office, but he declined and when he returned to his room yesterday, when his minerals were going to be removed, and when he went there he found that Roessler was dead.

Witness said he had seen the deceased in the room where his minerals were kept. Witness then brought him a couple of chairs and a cot. He said that Roessler the day before had been in the room where his minerals were kept. The latter was found by witness at 6:30 o'clock. Witness promised to meet him on Monday, when his minerals were going to be removed, and when he went there he found that Roessler was dead.

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
