INTERNAL DISSENSIONS AND PROFESSIONAL JEALOUSY.—Internal dissensions and professional jealousy are injuring the New York club, and the Telegram says that the situation has grown so serious of late that it would cause no surprise if President John B. Day's resignation was demanded at any time.

THE PROHIBITION AND PEOPLE'S PARTIES WILL ACT TOGETHER.—Representative men of the people's party and the prohibitionists have agreed that the two organizations shall amalgamate in Indiana.

COL. WICKLIFFE OF NEW ORLEANS INDICTED.—The grand jury at Baton Rouge, La., indicted Col. John C. Wickliffe of New Orleans Saturday for libel. The charge is that in a recent article published in the Evening Star, Wickliffe questioned there certain paragraphs referring upon Judge Becker's course in the Stanton case and conveying the impression that his rulings were prompted by improper motives.

SAN ANTONIO "HARD UP."—The city of San Antonio is financially embarrassed. There was no money to pay the city employees Saturday, and the San Antonio National Bank has refused to honor any more of the city's orders.

GEN. CLARKSON'S ILLNESS.—Gen. James S. Clarkson, who is at Asheville, N. C., is seriously ill with inflammatory rheumatism. His family will make an effort to take him to Hot Springs, Ark., as soon as he is well enough for the journey.

DAMNAGES FOR A LYONNESE ITALIAN.—Anna Rabelli, wife of Lorenzo Conzani, one of the Italian who shot the mob in New Orleans in revenge for the killing of Charles Police Hennessy of that city, has used the city of New Orleans and a number of gentlemen, who, it is charged, were members of the mob, for \$100,000.

ENGLAND'S GREAT STRIKE.

Four Hundred Thousand Miners Prepare for a Long Holiday.—The great coal miners' strike in England was inaugurated yesterday in accordance with the plan of the Miners' Federation, which, in its manifesto issued a few days ago, declared that the holiday the men proposed to take was for the purpose of clearing the markets of the surface coal and for restricting the output in order to prevent the masters from using the low prices as an excuse for lowering wages.

Many of the large influential establishments in Leeds and Manchester and on the Tees-side and Tyne-side and other places in the vicinity of the collieries and first-class work, factory operatives left their work yesterday morning. This means that work will not be resumed to-day, the manufacturers refusing to pay the extra money for the coal.

THE MINERS' FEDERATION WILL PAY THE MEN STRIKE WAGES DURING THE PERIOD OF ILLNESS. The only exception to this rule is for men who receive pay. It will require a very large sum of money to pay the men who it is said are being kept from their work.

IN THE AFTERNOON DELEGATES FROM ALL THE COLLIERIES IN THE COUNTY OF DURHAM MET IN THE town of Durham and finally decided that they would submit to no reduction in their wages. The Durham and Northumberland miners are the only ones in the county who have an organization of their own—the National Union. This union and the Miners' Federation of Great Britain and Ireland are entirely distinct.

THE ACTION OF THE DURHAM MINERS PROMISES TO CAUSE A PROTRACTED STRIKE IN THAT COUNTY, as the mine owners have refused to meet the men on their own terms. The men will not stop work at their own convenience, but will be employed again except at a rate of 12 1/2 per cent. To put the matter in a nutshell, the Durham miners are in a dispute with the owners and miners is one and the same, but there are several solutions of the question.
