THE PRESIDENT TODAY. John E. Riley, nominated to be minister to Denmark, is a brother-in-law to Senator Voorhees and a lawyer of high standing in New York as well as in this city, where he became well known through his practice before the court of Alabama.

THE PRESIDENT TODAY. Mr. Riley is about forty-nine years of age. He was born in Knox county, Indiana, near Vincennes, and nearly twenty-nine years ago went to New York to work for a living.

THE PRESIDENT TODAY. He worked hard and with great success at his profession as a lawyer. His appointment is said to be altogether due to his business influence, having been recommended by the National Bank, the Exchange National Bank, Gustave Schwab and the great shipping interests of New York.

THE PRESIDENT TODAY. He was a staunch democrat, and is a grandson of Col. Harrod, the first settler in Kentucky. During the last campaign he was president of a democratic club in Westchester county, N. Y.

THE PRESIDENT TODAY. He was a member of the factional quarrels of the party in New York. He is a man of means, with a handsome country seat at New Rochelle.

THE PRESIDENT TODAY. SENATOR KENTON.

THE PRESIDENT TODAY. James B. Easton, who is named as minister to France, was Mr. White's predecessor as a Senator from the state of Louisiana in the Fifty-first Congress.

THE PRESIDENT TODAY. He is a native of Louisiana, about fifty-nine years of age and was in the United States army, where he served in the reconstruction era in Louisiana, having been one of the commissioners which came to Washington to confer with President Johnson on the subject of Reconstruction.

THE PRESIDENT TODAY. Wade Hampton of South Carolina, who is to be made railroad commissioner, is a well-known figure in southern history and in Washington, where he served with distinction and credit in the United States Senate twelve consecutive years.
