

LUZZIE BORDEN'S CASE

Full Review of the Fall River Mystery.

THE TRIAL BEGINS THIS WEEK

Either the Prisoner is a Monster or a Being Most Cruelly Wronged—Strength of the Prosecution Not Yet Revealed—An Altered Will Given as a Motive.

The trial of Lizzie Borden for the murder of her parents which begins this week, promises to be one of the most notable in the court annals of New England, if not in the country.

The finding of Miss Borden guilty would mean more than the branding of her as a murderer, says the New York World. It would mean that twelve men after a careful consideration of all that is said for and against her, believe her to be not only one of the most brutal monsters ever known, but that they believe her to be a woman in all respects of which we have any record.

The crime for which this young woman is to be tried was committed in Fall River on the morning of August 4, 1892. It was committed between 10:30 and 11:15 o'clock, and the house wherein it was committed was still known as No. 22 1/2 street. It is in the heart of the city and within two miles of the city hall.

When Andrew J. Borden and his wife were murdered, Emma Borden was not at home. She was in the city of Fall River, and hence is entirely eliminated from all consideration in the discussion of the crime.

Andrew Borden was known as a hard-stod, close-bargaining business man, fond of money and the display of the same. He had no very warm friends and in his grasping, unrelenting way of doing business had made quite the number of enemies which such men usually make.

Lizzie herself testified that she wore a blue dress, and the women who saw her during the forenoon and at the time the murder was discovered bear her out in her testimony.

Everything she wore, even to the soles of her shoes, was submitted to the minutest scientific examination, and no traces of blood were found on any of her garments.

Her own story briefly is as follows: She said that her father complained of not feeling well and that she went to see him, adjusting the pillow for him, then she came into the room while he was sitting at the table.

John Holmes Widow Says He Was Murdered for Money.

OPEN THE SEWER GATES.

Gambling Continued Across the River Yesterday—Large Crowds Throng to the Outside Resorts at Rock Creek, Seaside and Personal News From Georgetown and Vicinity.

The wife of John H. Holmes, the colored man who was found floating in the canal last night, and on whose person was found \$10, states that when her husband left home he had nearly a hundred dollars in his possession.

The keepers of the gambling dens on the Virginia side of the Potomac, west of the aqueduct, were arrested yesterday, fearing that they were being used as a goodly source of trouble from an official source.

Yesterday about thirty white and colored boys were surprised by the police while in swimming off Winship's wharf, and a grand jury was called to inquire into the matter.

All but one of the swimmers escaped by going to the Washington side of the creek, but the one who remained stayed until until friends helped him to get ashore.

Yesterday's crowd of visitors to Georgetown was as great as on any previous Sunday of the season. It is estimated that 900 vehicular and 1,500 foot travelers crossed and recrossed the Aqueduct bridge during the day.

The gates at the mouth of Rock creek were opened yesterday to allow the free passage of the sewer water into the river, though it is understood the Commissioners ordered it to be done every Sunday.

A class of over 100 boys and girls were yesterday administered holy communion at Trinity Church for the first time. The boys had been instructed for the event by Father Rocofort and the girls by the sisters of the Visitation Academy.

Rev. Dr. P. S. Saxon, pastor of the Ebenezer A. M. E. Church, preached the first of a series of special sermons yesterday. This discourse was directed to parents.

There was a funeral service held on High street near Dumbarton avenue. It was purely local in its character and scope and the police were not called in.

The little mission chapel in the grounds of the Protestant cemetery was yesterday closed for the summer, after doing a season of splendid work.
