CROSSBY'S NOTES. Editor.

THE EVENING STAR has a regular and permanent circulation in Washington three times larger than that of any other paper in the city.

The associated banks of New York have taken time by the forelock and have authorized the issue of loan certificates for use among themselves in settling balances at the clearing house.

Notwithstanding the fact that the government has done much to defeat the emperor's plans as a result of the military force, it will be some time before the results of the voting is known, but the returns in the cities and the indications from the rural districts point unmistakably to another struggle between the people's representatives and the

That the emperor is disturbed over the already apparent defeat of his hopes is certain, but whether he will be autocratic or diplomatic is beyond the ken even of those who imagine themselves to be his advisers. Should he again desire the Reichstag if it refuses to do his bidding he will invite trouble of a description that may easily cost him his throne. Crowns are not held by divine right in those days, and unless the wearer of the German emblem of royalty permits the German people to do a little thinking for themselves the German republic is an early possibility within this or the coming generation.

Co-operative effort has, on several lines, been very successful both in Great Britain and in this country, but up to this time no serious attempt has been made to establish a system of co-operative housekeeping. In fact, it is really probable, for several energetic women in Colorado are going to give the scheme a chance. Denver is the experiment station, and in that city, on one square, will be forty-four houses, each of which is to be minus a kitchen. In the center of the square will be a structure in which kitchen, dining-room and laundry are to exist. Provision for the forty-four families are to be purchased at wholesale rates by a steward, first-class cooks will be employed and meals will be served either in the general dining-room or in the residences. Of course the idea is far from novel, but it has never been tried on such a scale as that proposed, so prophetic of the outcome has no foundation on which to build, but it does seem as though such a plan could be operated to the financial advantage of the participants. Perhaps there may be a little less of privacy than is enjoyed in individual homes, but there is much more of it than exists in the boarding-house. People who want back yards, and fences over which to rub rubbish to the discomfiture of their neighbors, will be very enthusiastic over the scheme, but to the average human being it does seem as though there was money and perhaps comfort in the proposition.
