Mr. Thomas Gulick Talks Sensibly About Hawaiian Affairs. A Bombastic and Licentious Government Was Overthrown by the Best Citizens—How It Happened.

Mr. Thomas L. Gulick of Hawaii and late of Oberlin, Ohio, who has been in this city for some days, today gave Star reporter his reasons why the President's message of last Monday is not conclusive as an argument or a statement of fact.

"Why does he call the ex-queen the 'constitutional sovereign'?" he began. "It was owing to her bold attempt to destroy the constitution and to establish a revolutionary despotism that she lost her throne."

"The truth is, as Mr. Cleveland had every opportunity to know if he had chosen to look where light was to be had, the Insular Commission never relinquished her purpose to destroy the constitution."

"The President says there was no rioting Monday," continued Mr. Gulick. "He is right. The merchants, lawyers, doctors, and the respectable citizens were determined to resist any attempt of the government in place of the smuggling, gambling, licentious, opium and lottery ring that had for twenty years infested the islands."

"These are the men to whom he was prepared to say through Messrs. Gresham and Lincoln to her chief constituents."

"We Hawaiian find it difficult," Mr. Gulick went on, "to believe that the chief obstacle in the mind of the ex-queen to her project was the fact that she knew that the American people would not support her project."

"I am a strict temperance man in the sense of being a prohibitionist, but I feel tomorrow as I do at this present moment I promise you that I will never take another drink of intoxicating liquor as long as I live."

CANTERBURY TEAM WINS. Close and Exciting Game of Foot Ball This Morning.

Only One Touchdown Made Late in the Game—Good Playing on Both Sides—The Game.

Canterbury won the ball on the toss up and Aman opened the first half with a run of ten yards. Fugitt followed around left end for a gain of six yards. An offside play gave Canterbury the right yard then kicked for a good gain of forty yards, the longest of the game. Aman received the ball, but failed to gain. Fugitt and Aman then made gains of six and two yards respectively around right yard.

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
