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FUNERAL OF KOSSUTH

Services in the Evangelical Church at Turin. HUNGARIAN REPRESENTATIVES ATTEND

Remains to Reach Buda Pesth Tomorrow. GENERAL FOREIGN MATTERS

TURIN, Italy, March 28.—The funeral services over the remains of Louis Kossuth were held this morning at the Evangelical Church, beginning at 9 o'clock.

The city was crowded with sightseers and the streets presented a most remarkable appearance, owing to the immense number of Hungarians in full national costume, who were to be seen on all sides.

The streets through which the funeral procession passed were lined by the municipal guards, and on all sides were to be seen mourning emblems and craped-draped flags.

The coffin, inside the church, rested on a handsome catafalque and was covered with flowers. In addition, the church was filled with floral emblems sent from all parts of Hungary, as well as from many points in Europe.

Standing picturesquely around the catafalque was a guard of honor of Hungarian students in Hungarian costume. This guard of honor will accompany the remains to Buda Pesth in the next few days.
