Property Left to Be Repaired and Not Called For.

Mr. S. T. Thomas, attorney for the District, today rendered an opinion to the Commissioners with reference to the communication of Mr. C. A. Emme, gun and locksmith, of 608 11th street southwest, inquiring whether he has the right to sell guns and locks which have been left at his shop for repairs and not called for, which was referred to him for his opinion.

Mr. Thomas says that whenever a workman or artisan by his labor or skill increases the value of personal property placed in his possession to be improved he has a lien upon it for his proper charges until paid. Section 711 of the Revised Statutes of the United States relating to "the district of Columbia gives any person having possession of the same, who shall make, alter, repair or besow any labor on any article of personal property, at the request of the owner or lawful possessor thereof, a lien on such property so made, altered or repaired, or upon which labor has been bestowed, in the same manner and to the same extent as if the property were real estate.
