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KELLY WAS INNOCENT.

Two Other Boys Robbed the Herd

William Kelly, a colored boy, was arrested several days ago on suspicion that he was involved in the robbery of the cash box from a herd of cattle on the Capitol grounds on the night of the recent elections, and Judge Miller sent him to jail for six months. Yesterday Read Stevenson, fifteen years old, and Charles Henderson, who is one year his senior, appeared in court for the robbery. They admitted their guilt and said that Kelly was innocent. Stevenson put up the job. He ran along near the herd and attracted the driver's attention. Henderson grabbed the cash box and ran. They got about 30 cents from the box and spent most of it for pies, cakes and candy, and bought some small articles of clothing.

Policeman Vermillion arrested Kelly and Henderson, while Stevenson surrendered to the police the evening.

Judge Miller acquitted the boys and recommended them until tomorrow, when Kelly will again be questioned.

The A. P. A. Controversy.

Inclosed is a copy of a constitution of the Supreme Council of the A. P. A. of the World. Chas. Ross says Dr. Eaton was never legally elected as a delegate to the Supreme Council at Milwaukee. Article 2, section 2, says who shall constitute the Supreme Council. By that section it is provided that the Supreme Council shall include in its membership "one delegate from each subordinate council in the states, territories, provinces or countries in which no Superior Council has been formed."

D. Bell. The committee on lighting street lamps reported a bid from James Johnson at \$7.50 per month, and the bid was accepted and lamps directed to be lighted at once.

A number of bills were reported from the finance committee and approved. Permission was granted W. B. Turner to erect a building on the corner of Little Falls street and Block 10, and to sell the building to the Falls Church Improvement Society, through A. P. Eastman, committee, in regard to the dangerous condition of the railroad crossing at East End, and the clerk was instructed to lay the complaint before the board of health.

The county court has approved of the bill for the construction of a new road from the Falls Church to Fairfax Court House. The route will be from the Falls Church to the Court House, and thence to the Court House. The road will be 100 feet wide, and will be paved with gravel.
