Philadelphia Investigation. Mayor Warwick of Philadelphia has issued a public statement, in which he denounces the senate investigating committee's method of taking testimony as being unjust and un-American. He intimates that the political parties enter largely into the investigation.

Preparations Completed for the Quarterly Meeting of the Federation. The District Federation of Women's Clubs is making preparations for its quarterly meeting, to be held next Thursday afternoon and evening in the lecture room of All Souls' Church. The afternoon will be devoted to the reports of the presidents of the ten clubs now belonging to the federation and to an informal talk by Mrs. Ellen S. Mussey explaining the present laws affecting the legal status of women in the District and presenting the laws as proposed by the committee appointed by the federation for this purpose. The evening will be devoted to addressing the same subject, music, an original poem and a formal report of the committee on revision of laws affecting women. This matter has been exciting extensive discussion in the different women's clubs of the city and were it not so lamentable it would be ludicrous to note the astonishment and disbelieving looks of the members when they learn that the bonnets they wear belong to their husbands and they themselves have absolutely no legal claim to them and the loss of a bonnet when they are at last convinced that the District laws would uphold their husbands in giving or willing absolutely away from them the claim they have by purchase and reared. These are a few of the many laws under discussion, and it is expected that the lecture room will be filled with women anxious to know if they have any rights which men are bound to respect.

Mail Car Time Card. A neat time schedule for the little white mail car on Pennsylvania Avenue has been prepared by Superintendent Vickery of the railway mail service. Those who make frequent use of the car it is well worth having. It gives the complete and accurate itinerary of each of the thirteen round trips daily. To people who sometimes wait for street cars and think they are out of time, it would be a surprise to see how closely on time the mail car passes each station and stopping place on the route.
