A NUMEROUSLY-SIGNED DECLARATION

It Contains the Names of Many Eminent in England.

TO BE SENT TO THIS COUNTRY

LONDON, January 28.—The text of a declaration is published here urging the establishment of a permanent tribunal of arbitration for all the English-speaking nations and suggesting that this document give effect to the resolutions on this subject of Congress in 1892 and the house of commons in 1894.

ROLLING MILLS RESUME.

Six Thousand Men Go Back to Their Work.

CHICAGO, January 28.—The rolling mills of the Illinois Steel Company, located at south Chicago, which were shut down December 31 in order to make extensive repairs in the rail and steel departments, opened today. This gives work to 6,000 men, who have been idle since the shutdown.

Court-Martial Ordered.

A general court-martial, with Capt. T. A. Binham, corps of engineers, as president, and Lieut. C. W. Kupper, corps of engineers, as recorder, has been ordered to meet at Willeto Point, N. Y., tomorrow, for the trial of three prisoners as may be ordered before.

GO TO HELP MACEO.

Gen. Gomez Leaves for the Province of Pinar del Rio.

HAVANA, Cuba, January 28.—Gen. Maximo Gomez has raised the village of San Juan, southwest of Bejucal, province, going westward, apparently to the assistance of Gen. Antonio Maceo, who has been reported to be hard pressed by the Spanish troops in the province of Pinar del Rio.

THE WOMEN'S HOUR

They Took Possession of the Capitol This Morning.

ARGUING FOR FEMALE SUFFRAGE

Mr. Blackwell Rouses the Ire of Southern Men.

M. R. PEEFER SPEAKS

Owing to the fact that the women of the suffrage convention were given a congressional hearing at 10:30 o'clock today there was no morning session of the convention.

The hearing before the House Judiciary committee was largely attended, the seating capacity of the committee room was taxed to the utmost and the crowd overflowed into the corridor outside. The suffragists had massed their forces in array against Chairman Henderson and his associates, and addresses were made by a dozen or more of the best of the women speakers.
