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THAT WOODEN ROOF

A Glimpse of Architectural Absurdity on the Post Office Building.

At the building itself the reply is given that "the plans call for such a roof covering," and hence the wooden sheathing is being unquestionably put in place, notwithstanding the apparent absurdity of such a topping on a massive structure of stone that is supposed to present the latest ideas of architecture and engineering.

The late Gen. Casey remarked to a Star reporter, a few days before his death, that this wooden roofing was an unheard-of thing in the history of architecture.
