Secretary Herbert Says He Confirmed About Winter Maneuvers.

PLAN MAY BE ABANDONED

Admiral Bunce, commanding the North Atlantic fleet, had another conference with Secretary Herbert at the Navy Department this morning in regard to the proposed winter maneuvers.

The admiral's visit at this time has given rise to all sorts of sensational rumors of a possible conflict with Spain over the Cuban affair, some of which go so far as to say that the United States warships are being ordered to a war footing with a view to the forcible evacuation of Havana.

This story is ridiculed in administration circles as being exceedingly far-fetched, and at the Navy Department it is stated in the most positive terms that the visit of Admiral Bunce has no warlike significance whatever.

The same arguments are now being advanced against the proposed visit of the fleet to the Caribbean sea at this time when the relations between the United States and Spain are of such a delicate character.
