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ARRANGEMENTS IN ALEXANDRIA

Regular Meeting of R. E. Lee Camp of Confederate Veterans.

Arrangements for Memorial Day, May 24—Special Primary Election in Progress—General News.

Evening Star Bureau, No. 27 King street, Bell Telephone No. 100, ALEXANDRIA, Va., May 2, 1899.

The regular monthly meeting of R. E. Lee Camp, Confederate Veterans, held last evening, was one of the most largely attended in the history of the organization, and interest and enthusiasm were commensurate with the attendance. Commander A. C. Wyckoff called the meeting to order. The first business was the reception of a report from a committee appointed to draft resolutions of respect to the memory of the late Henry Nevitt. A committee was then appointed charged with similar duties regarding the late John I. Proctor and Wm. H. Bacon.

The matter of confederate memorial day exercises for May 24 was then taken up and a committee appointed to have charge of arrangements with members as follows: Messrs. William A. Smith, chairman; E. C. Graham, A. C. Wyckoff, J. O. Adam and E. C. Graham, Messrs. F. J. Davidson and Edgar Warfield were appointed to represent the Woman's Auxiliary in supplying flowers; Commander Wyckoff announced the acceptance of Rev. William M. Dame of Baltimore as orator for the day. The resignation of Rev. J. T. Williams as chaplain was tendered and accepted, though his name was not removed. Captain K. Kemper was chosen to fill the vacancy. Other routine business was transacted, and the camp adjourned at a late hour.

Bold Theft.
The police here have been notified of a bold theft committed this morning about 11 o'clock at the boarding house of Miss Alenworth, No. 112 South Henry street. The alleged robber is described as a well-dressed young man, who called at the residence to ask for food. He stated that his name was Thomas Jones and that he was a student. He was shown to a room, which shortly afterwards was found vacant. Two handsome suits of clothes, a pair of gold cuff buttons, a revolver and other articles were missing. It is supposed the man was a stranger and was aided in his work by an accomplice.

Special Primary in Progress.
A special democratic primary is in progress in the first ward, for the purpose of making a nomination for common council between Messrs. Peter Aitchison and T. Alton Moore, both of whom at the regular primary received 141 votes. The polls were opened at 6 o'clock a.m. and will be closed at 6 p.m. As yet no ballots have been cast. It appears that a small vote will be polled. Mr. Moore has vigorously protested against the primary on the ground that the democratic committee had consented to have the name of himself and Mr. Aitchison placed on the ticket for the general election. This action was repudiated by the committee yesterday afternoon, due largely to the determination of Chairman Carter and Secretary Boothe to carry into effect the original ruling of the committee. Notwithstanding that, Mr. Moore refused to allow his name to be used today, but it appears on the ticket with that of Mr. Aitchison.

Mayor Simpson's Veto.
There has been some talk among members of the city council of calling that body together in special session to consider Mayor Simpson's veto of a council ordinance empowering the committee on streets to take charge of all street improvements begun under the supervision of the city engineer, and also to have authority in regard to the street parking toll. It was the intention to have called for a meeting tonight, but a councilman this morning stated that, as that had not been done, the matter would probably be referred until Tuesday, the 9th instant, the date for regular meeting.

General and Personal.
Mayor Simpson disposed of the following cases in his police court this morning: Nelson Langley, arrested by Officer Beach, charged with assaulting M. Morris, was assessed \$10. T. Olden and Charles Church, both colored, charged with street fighting, were fined \$2.00 each. Wm. Pinkney, colored, charged with disorderly conduct, was fined \$1.00. J. W. Gray, senior deacon, Universal Lodge, No. 1, A. F. and A. Masons, met last night and elected the following officers: Magnus L. Robinson, worshipful master; Charles C. Williams, C. W., senior warden; Weston Green, junior warden; William A. Carter, secretary; Rev. R. B. Robinson, chaplain; J. W. Coles, junior deacon; J. W. Gray, senior deacon; William S. Bayne, tier. The installation will be public. E. C. Church South at Dal Ray will tender a reception this evening to the pastor, J. Day, the newly appointed pastor at that charge, in conjunction with the M. E. Church South in Georgetown. The funeral of Presley Bledham, the Mexican war veteran who died Sunday morning, will take place tomorrow afternoon at the late residence of the deceased, in West End. The Woman's Auxiliary to R. E. Lee Camp, C. V., will hold its regular monthly meeting at the Lee Camp Hall, Monday evening, the 8th inst. The railroad reading room workers have arranged for a series of revival meetings, to be opened next Sunday in the auditorium on Wolf street. Rev. T. P. Revelle will open the services.

SECOND ANNUAL MEETING.
American Gastro-Enterological Association in Session.

The second annual meeting of the American Gastro-Enterological Association was held in the banquet hall at the Shoreham today. There were two sessions during the day, and a small but distinguished gathering of the members of the society. The officers for the present year are: President, Dr. D. D. Stewart of Philadelphia; first vice president, Dr. Max Einhorn of New York; second vice president, Dr. John C. Hemmeter of Baltimore; secretary and treasurer, Dr. Charles D. Aaron of Detroit.

In addition to these there were present today the following: Dr. W. D. Booker of Baltimore, Dr. J. Kaufmann of New York, Dr. Lewis E. Barton of Philadelphia, Dr. Frank H. Murdoch of New York, Dr. E. J. Meltzer of New York, Dr. Julius Friedwald of Baltimore, Dr. Featon B. Trickett of Chicago, Dr. A. Buchman of Fort Wayne, Ind., and Dr. Henry L. Elsner of Syracuse, N. Y.

The session opened at 9 a.m. with the meeting of the council, composed of Drs. Murdoch, Buchman and Elsner. At 10 o'clock the association began the transaction of business. President Stewart made brief introductory remarks and then the program of papers was carried out: "Further Remarks on Erosions of the Stomach," by Dr. Einhorn; "Fate of the Digestive Ferments," by Dr. Hemmeter; "An Experimental Study of the Absorption of Strychnine in the Different Sections of the Alimentary Canal of Dogs," by Dr. Meltzer.

The afternoon session, beginning at 2:30 p.m., the papers read were: "A Case of Dilatation of the Stomach Due to Latent Ulcer at the Pylorus," Operation by Halsted," by Dr. Murdoch; "Experiments on Gastric Digestion," by Dr. Trickett; "The State of the Gastric Secretions in the Disease of the Heart," by Dr. Murdoch; "Gastric Ulcer Associated with Anacidity," by Dr. Brinton; "Some Remarks on Pylorospasm," by Dr. Kaufmann; "The Method in Administering Hydrochloric Acid," by Dr. Aaron.

thought all delegations should go to the state convention without a pledge. He was asked if the national committee had made any plans for the campaign of 1900. He said that no definite program for the conduct of the national battle had been adopted. The issues, he thought, the future would have to determine largely. "The national committee will meet this fall," said the senator. "Then it is likely the subject of issues will be taken up. It has been suggested that trusts and imperialism might be the democratic issue. Silver is doubtless a dead issue. As to the future of the government of the islands, there is but one thing for us to do now, and that is to compare the insurgents. I can see no party issue in it."

SECOND PAYMENT MADE.
Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars Deposited for R. R. Stock.

Mr. Frederick C. Stevens, the purchaser of the Metropolitan and Columbia street railroads, today paid to Mr. Charles J. Bell, the president of the American Security and Trust Company, as trustee, the sum of \$800,000. This was the second payment of the purchase money for the stock of these companies, which has been deposited
