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FIERCE FIRE AT MIDNIGHT.

The Aggregate of Losses Estimated to Be About \$165,000.

Damages to Plant of Washington Woodworking Company and Two Livery Stables.

The plant of the Washington Woodworking Company and the stables of John Simmons and M. H. Sullivan were badly damaged by fire about 11:30 o'clock last night. Two of the buildings are on 12th street, while Sullivan's stable is on Ohio avenue. It is estimated that the losses amount to about \$165,000.

Message to the Unchurched.

Rev. Edward Everett Hale spoke on the "Unitarian Message to the Unchurched." He said the business of the Unitarian Church was to weaken the influence of powerful religious organizations in promoting erroneous religious views.

Opposes Ecclesiastical Organizations.

"We must do everything in our power," he said, "to destroy ecclesiastical organizations for the sake of religious liberty." The orthodox churches he termed "great religious corporations," inimical to human rights and freedom.

The Closing Address.

"The message of the Unitarian church to our own people" was the theme of the closing address of the conference. Rev. Saml A. Eliot of Boston, the speaker, said in part: "Our great effort is to make the indifferent different. We are sometimes disappointed that so many of our people do not care little about our own work."

Appeal for Funds.

"This seventh anniversary of the American Unitarian Association cannot be better celebrated than by raising \$75,000 for its work—which means an increase of 30 per cent. We are called from every state in the Union to help build Unitarian churches, but often have to refuse because of the lack of funds."

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RELIGIOUS CORPORATIONS.

Dr. Edward Everett Hale's Estimate of the Orthodox Churches.

Views Expressed in an Address Before Unitarian Conference—The Closing Services Last Evening.

After the close of the report of the proceedings in the Star of the conference, as printed in the Star of yesterday, a meeting was held in the interest of the American Unitarian Association. "The Unitarian Message to Other Branches of the Church in America" was the topic, and an address was delivered by Rev. Howard N. Brown of Boston, who, in part, said: "The church suffers because a certain philosophy of religion has been proclaimed as the only true religion. Could we get the old re-written, it would be done until all coercion of religious belief was at an end. We wholly repudiate the idea of the guilt of erroneous belief. The church is not built on miraculous events, but on the personal leadership of Jesus. This is the only ground on which we can stand, a bond of union and missionary enterprise. More than this must not be expected of any man. The day will come when all churches will be content with their own task of proclaiming this message having just begun, we must demonstrate the truth of it by giving assistance to any missionary organizations on any possible."

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THE HIGH SCHOOL CADETS.

List of Officers Recommended by Board and Approved by Gen. Harries.

Company Commanders Selected—Great Interest Manifested by the Students.

The enlistment of High School cadets in the several military companies of the school began last week of this month, and enough students have been secured to insure fully as large a representation as last year, and to maintain the high efficiency and standard established in the past by the Washington High School Cadet Regiment. For the first two weeks the student cadets were divided into squads at the different schools and drilled under the instruction and command of temporary officers. In the meantime candidates for commissions in the companies, battalions and the regiment were given rigid examinations before a board of three officers of the District National Guard, and the organization of companies with permanent officers for the year of 1899-1900 is now being effected. The board of examiners is composed of Lieutenant Colonel Burton R. Ross, 1st Regiment, D. C. N. G.; First Lieutenant S. Porter House, adjutant of the 1st Battalion, D. C. N. G.; and First Lieutenant J. S. Robinson, Company B, 1st Battalion, D. C. N. G., and the selections of the most able and scholarly students, both military and civilian, are being made. The names of the company commanders and their adjutants have been announced at the Central High School. To be colonel, R. D. Adams of the Central school; to be lieutenant colonel, H. Potter of the Eastern school; to be major of the 1st Battalion for the Central High school, J. H. Feltner of the Eastern school; to be major of the 2d Battalion for the Eastern school, M. R. Bourne of the Eastern school; to be regimental adjutant, Maurice Weaver of the Western school; to be regimental quartermaster, Clifton Young of the Western school; to be adjutant for the 1st Battalion, First Lieutenant Lowell, adjutant of the 1st Battalion, Company A—Captain, Baum; first lieutenant, Coon; second lieutenant, Buell; third sergeant, Newton; fourth sergeant, McKnew; fifth sergeant, Orton. Officers for Company B—Captain, Churchill; first lieutenant, Bell; second lieutenant, Shepard; third sergeant, Bensch; fourth sergeant, Kaas; West, third sergeant; West, fourth sergeant; fifth sergeant, Hennig.
