ITS ANNUAL REPORT

Statement of Operations of the Emergency Hospital.

APPROPRIATION OF \$17,000 ASKED FOR

Reports of the Staff President and the Treasurer.

LADIES' AUXILIARY BOARD

The report of the operations of the Central Dispensary and Emergency Hospital during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1899, was made public by the District Commissioners today.

Mr. Boardman referred in his report to the gratifying manifestation of the interest of the public in the institution, as indicated by the number of those who attended the public inspection, and he extends, on behalf of the board of trustees, his thanks to the members of both houses of Congress and to all citizens interested in the work of the institution to visit it and see the number of those who are being treated for which it was created.

Miss Margaret E. Gale, secretary of the ladies' auxiliary board, in her report gives a history and the extent of the repairs and improvements made during the past year, promising further assistance in this line.

The object of this board, it is stated, is to raise money to assist the institution, its members being classed as active and honorary, of contributing to the fund.

The report of the treasurer of the institution, Mr. John E. Wright, places the assets, including real estate, at \$39,000, at \$2,583.31, and the liabilities, notes payable, at \$29,000, making the net assets \$10,000.

Dr. Swan M. Burnett, president of the training staff, in his report first calls attention to the great improvements which have been made since the last report, and refers gratefully to the gift of Mr. Burnett, a lady, of \$1,000, which has been added to the fund.

Dr. Burnett also refers to the fact that more than a year ago the nursing department of the hospital joined with that of the Washington Asylum in the formation of a training school, under the charter of the Washington Training School for Nurses.

During the year the system of requiring a certificate of worthiness from every applicant for relief was followed out most strictly. The Associated Charities, Dr. Burnett says, alone examined and reported upon more than 1,500 of such cases, and to that organization he adds, the thanks of the community, as well as those of the institution, are due for its efforts to diminish the evil effects of "hospitalism."

The total number of new cases treated in the dispensary during the year was 7,080; the number of revisits 21,061, a grand total of 28,141. The total number of new patients in the hospital was 4,707, and 1,954 a grand total of 6,661, and a grand total for both institutions of 34,807.

The number of operations in the clinics was 541; in the hospital, 1,963; a total in both of 2,504. Number of admissions to the hospital admitted to the wards, 685; of deaths, 74; of prescriptions compounded, 35,570, and of ambulance calls, 77.

Dr. Burnett highly compliments the hospital staff, and calls attention to the amount of valuable work done in the Lionel Lincoln, in the X-ray department, especially, much that is of unusual importance was accomplished. The equipment of the institution, he states, is thorough, and the hospital is being maintained in the best conditions, to the profession and public in general.
