SHOOTS HIMSELF IN MOUTH

Millard P. McCormick, a Miller, Attempts Suicide This Morning.

Formally Served as a Deputy United States Marshal—Believed He Will Recover.
Millard P. McCormick, forty-four years old, employed as a miller at Galt's flour mill, attempted suicide about 8 o'clock this morning by shooting himself in the mouth. The bullet entered somewhere in the unfortunate man's neck. The surgeon who attended him believes he will recover. He is under treatment at the Casualty Hospital, hitherto known as the Eastern Dispensary, near the Capitol.

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MUST GET ITS OWN DUMP.

Local Company's Complaint Refused.

Mr. Charles H. Galt, president of the Potomac Fire Insurance Company, a few days ago wrote the District Commissioners that permission has been denied the company to deposit certain refuse on the public dumps. This refuse, Mr. Galt explained, is a tar water, and as the company has been in the habit of depositing it on the public dumps, he required that the company should do with it as the District Commissioners directed. The matter was referred by the Commissioners to the superintendent of the street cleaning department, who has explained to the board that the Potomac Fire Insurance Company, having objected to such refuse being deposited on the government dumps, it is presumed by the street cleaning department that the refuse is not proper material to be thrown upon the District dumps. The District dumps, it is further explained, are situated near the Capitol. The superintendent of the street cleaning department, and the head of the department suggests that the Potomac Fire Insurance Company, in place of its refuse in the same manner, which suggests the Commissioners have approved.

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AFFAIRS IN GEORGETOWN.

Regular Meeting of the Citizens' Association Tomorrow Evening.

Will Assemble in Enlarged Hall of First Co-Operative Building Association—Other Items.
The regular business meeting of the Georgetown Citizens' Association will be held tomorrow evening at 7:30 o'clock, at the hall of the First Co-Operative Building Association, 1325 2d street. The hall has been enlarged considerably, a large arch having been provided, extending the hall to the adjoining iron front building. The meeting will be presided over by Mr. B. T. Janney, the president, while Mr. James H. Taylor, the newly elected secretary, will keep the minutes.
