OUR TRADE WITH HAVANA Exports to This Country for Nine Months, \$16,411,150.

Exceeded Shipments to All Other Countries by \$606,611—Tobacco, Cigars and Sugar in the Lead.

The War Department has made public a complete statement of the value of merchandise and gold coin exported from the port of Havana, Cuba, for the first nine months of American occupation, showing the volume of trade by countries. The exports to the United States exceeded those to all other countries combined by \$906,611.

The total exports for the period of nine months amounted to \$22,215,980. Using these figures as a basis, the total exports at the port of Havana alone for the first year of American occupation will exceed \$20,000,000.

The exports by countries for the nine months were as follows: To the United States, merchandise to the value of \$12,174,776 and gold coin amounting to \$1,267,374, making a total shipped to this country of \$13,442,150.

During the same months there was shipped to Spain merchandise to the value of \$8,078,724 and \$1,869,429 in gold coin, making a total exported from Havana to Spain of \$9,948,153. France took merchandise to the value of \$1,642,487, and \$315,510 in gold coin, a total of \$1,957,997. Of countries taking merchandise only, there was exported to the United Kingdom \$947,291; to Germany, \$214,100; to the Argentine Republic, \$78,214; to Mexico, \$74,162; to Venezuela, \$29,463; to Belgium, \$17,138; to Uruguay, \$14,617; to Italy, \$10,619; to Chile, \$5,000; to Portugal, \$7,994; to Guatemala, \$5,962; to Peru, \$1,412; to Ecuador, \$2,682; to Holland, \$490; to Nicaragua, \$294; to Sweden and Norway, \$142; and to Turkey, \$25.

Alexander Specht, D.D., pronounced a benediction, the band played "Auld Lang Syne," and the service was at an end.
