CURRENT SPORTING NOTES

Sporting Life, the official organ of the contemplated American Association, has the following to say in this week's paper about the new movement. Editor Richter stands close to the promoters of the association, and his writings can be classed with the inspired orator. He says:

A great many misleading statements are being printed in the papers about the new American Association, owing to the fact that the promoters of that organization are not giving their plans away or are talking foolishly for publication, but are working secretly to perfect the organization. The scribbles are necessarily driven to speculation and they are doing some very bad guessing.

"The facts are just as stated in last week's Sporting Life, and all statements regarding the association in this paper may be accepted as authoritative and official.
