OPPOSE USE OF THE PARK

Citizens State Objections to Proposed Grant to Railway Company.

Discussion Before the Commissioners of Bill Authorizing Abolition of Grade Crossings.

The District Commissioners today gave a hearing to persons interested in the bill now pending before the Board of Public Works. The Pennsylvania Railroad Company to abolish grade crossings and for other purposes, and especially to those opposed to the provision in the bill authorizing the company to extend its line through reservation 17, or Garfield Park.

Views of Mr. Solberg. Mr. Thorwald Solberg, a resident and property owner in Southeast Washington, followed Mr. Dodge, contending that the mere desire of the railroad company to straighten its tracks is not a good reason why a good portion of Garfield Park should be forever given up to it.

Not a Good Argument. Mr. Solberg remarked that this is not, in his judgment, much of an argument, certainly not, he declared, for taking away one-fifth of a public park and giving it to a corporation for nothing.

Providence Hospital Objects. Dr. J. W. Bayne of the staff of Providence Hospital addressed the Commissioners as the representative of Sister Louise, in charge of the institution, adding to the remarks as to the greater annoyance which will be occasioned the patients therein by bringing the railroad tracks 500 feet nearer it.

Mr. Weller's Interest. Mr. Weller said he is a very much interested party, explaining that he has lately acquired twenty-nine houses as a permanent investment in the section, and that if the route should be a more southern one these houses would have to go. In reply to an inquiry, he said he would, however, see that the company paid him well for them, at such a price, he thought, as would benefit him much more than if they were not taken by the company.

Quoting from a report made by a committee of 100 citizens in 1887, Mr. Weller stated that in a special committee of the main body, composed of many citizens of South Washington, had then proposed that there should be one union station for the railroads entering the city, and that it should be erected on reservation 17, the present site of Garfield Park.

Citizens' Association Represented. Mr. Thomas W. Smith, who appeared on behalf of the East Washington Citizens' Association, suggested that the tunnel be continued from 4th street east through squares 797, 798 and 799, which would obviate the use of a permanent station at Garfield Park.

Mr. A. L. Salstein urged the Commissioners to use every effort to compel the railroad company to pay for all land taken by it, and also opposed the use of it any portion of the park to the company.
