Mrs. Burleigh's Luncheon in Mrs. Powers' Honor Today. Mrs. Burleigh, wife of Representative Burleigh of Maine, gave a very beautiful luncheon today, which was served in the green dining room at Rauscher's, in honor of Mrs. Powers, wife of the governor of Maine.

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DEATH OF WM. WURDEMAN. Noted for His Skill in Manufacturing Delicate Instruments.

Mr. William Wurde mann, who died yesterday quite suddenly of acute pneumonia at his residence on Capitol Hill, was identified with this city since 1834. Mr. Wurde mann was born in Bremen, Germany, January 1, 1811. He studied at Heidelberg, came to this country and entered the United States coast survey in 1834 as assistant to Prof. Hassler. After several years there of survey work his scientific and inventive ability determined him to improve the instruments then in use. He resigned from the survey and became an extensive manufacturer of astronomical and geodetic instruments. The Wurde mann inventions in that line became famous both in this country and in Europe. Mr. Wurde mann, in fact, was the pioneer in the United States of that branch of manufacture, and his inventions have never been superseded.

Mr. Wurde mann was married three times—his first wife was Miss Lydia Vanderbil, second Miss Lucy Parsons and his widow, Miss Caroline Morford, all of New Jersey.

Those with him at the last were his wife and his son, John W. Wurde mann; his daughter, Mrs. H. P. Sanders; Mrs. Thomas J. Van Alstyne of Albany, N. Y.; and Miss Johanna Wurde mann, and Captain H. P. Sanders.

William E. Curtis to Lecture.

William E. Curtis of this city will lecture tonight before the National Geographic Society on "A Journey Through Bolivia." In the summer of 1890 Mr. Curtis passed several months in Bolivia, and his lecture will be a narration of the impressions and observations he gathered during this visit. Numerous illustrations from pictures taken by his own camera will illustrate the remarks. The lecture begins at 8 o'clock, in the First Congregational Church, corner of 10th and G streets.
