THE NATIONAL GUARD

The Court-Martial in Case of Captain Chisholm.

FINDINGS FAVORABLE TO DEFENDANT

Preparations for the Annual Encampment in July.

MEETING AT SEA GIRT

As heretofore stated in The Star, it is understood that the findings of not guilty have been reported in the case of Capt. D. V. Chisholm, Company B, 2d Battalion, District of Columbia National Guard, recently tried by court-martial on charges alleging conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman. The vote was in favor of the accused officer by a most narrow margin. The papers in this case have been referred to the judge advocate general, District of Columbia militia, for review from a legal standpoint.

It cannot be announced with any degree of accuracy whether or not the proceedings will be approved or disapproved by the commanding general. It is pointed out that the reviewing authority cannot consistently disregard the testimony of such officers as Maj. James E. Bell, colonel in command of the District of Columbia militia. To approve the proceedings would be a tacit admission by the reviewing authority that the conduct of Major Bell, as well as others, was worthless.

No matter what may be the action of the reviewing authority, Captain Chisholm will, of course, be retained in the District of Columbia militia. Announcement to that effect will be made in a very few days. It is incidentally changes of a material nature among certain officers of high rank are expected as a direct outcome of the court-martial.

Annual Encampment.

It may be definitely announced that the encampment of the troops of the District of Columbia National Guard will be held about the middle of next July. The site of the encampment will be comparatively near this city, adjacent to water supply in a healthy location, and to which all necessary supplies may be transported without difficulty. The ground is also adaptable for the construction of rifle ranges. In the near future orders will be issued from headquarters directing that preliminary instruction be given during the spring months in all arms, John A. King to be in command of the marching and the like. Thus there will be accomplished in the army considerable minor work that would otherwise consume valuable moments of the camp party.

A number of innovations are to be introduced in connection with the encampment. It is the intention to issue to the troops the prescribed army ration. In addition each company commander will be daily allowed a certain amount of cash, the allowance to be based on the actual number of men of the company in camp. The money will be by company, as was the case last year. The idea is to see just how well the company officers will manage the money.

There will not be as much done in the way of practice marching as in the last year. The marching will be limited to a few marches during the encampment. It may be, if the conditions warrant, a general march or perhaps a brigade movement.

Naval Cruise.
It is announced that the Navy Department will commence this year at New Orleans, April 23, and will extend up the coast, for the different states, until some time in October. The cruise will not be less than seven days' actual practice at sea, under similar conditions as last year.

The states in their order will be Louisiana, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Massachusetts, and Maine. The itinerary for the first four states has been arranged. The dates will be, approximately, for the northern states, within ten days of those of the southern states.

Transfer of the Onida.
Lieut. Commander S. G. Hopkins, Naval Battalion, will take command of the officers and men detailed to bring the U. S. S. Onida from the Norfolk yard to this city. He has been ordered to proceed with his vessel to Norfolk and report in person to the commanding general, District of Columbia militia, where he will formally take possession. He will bring the vessel in tow of the tug Tecumseh to Washington and turn the craft over to Commander Hains of the Naval Battalion.

The party will leave this city for Norfolk by steamer the following day, the 10th instant. Gen. Hurler and Adj. Gen. Lovv, who accompany him, will be in the neighborhood of Norfolk about the time indicated, may return to Washington about the 15th instant. The party will be accompanied by the U. S. S. Onida.

Discipline and Other Matters.
The judge advocate general, District of Columbia militia, has been instructed to prepare, for presentation to Congress, a bill for the betterment of the discipline in the National Guard.

The Ambulance Corps has been granted permission to hold a social gathering in its quarters at the Center Market Army the evening of Friday, March 30.

Those members of the District of Columbia National Guard who are in the Philippines service in the Philippines are to be honorably discharged from the guard. In directing this action the headquarters officials call attention to the fact that it is manifestly impossible for such men to serve in two active organizations at the same time. The discharge is deemed best that they be discharged.

Corporal John A. O'Neil has been elected captain of the 4th Battalion. The meeting of the adjutant general of the National Guard of the several states will be held at the Shoreham Hotel, this city, the 14th instant. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss the proposed increase in the annual allotment of the militia from \$400,000 to \$2,000,000.

The ceremony in connection with the meeting of recruits for the 2d Regiment Wednesday at Gettysburg, Texas, was successful in every way. About twenty new recruits subscribed to the oath of allegiance. Major Simms of the 5th Battalion, who was in command of the recruits, explaining to them the meaning of the oath and the duties of the National Guard. After the ceremony dancing was in order.
