The order of the day for the fourth session of the Baltimore annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, which was called to order at 9 o'clock this morning in Mount Vernon Place Church, was the reception into full connection of three deacons whose characters were passed Thursday.

Bishop Warren A. Candler of Georgia presided. The young men who took the church vows were Howard A. Murrill, Daniel W. Griffin and Seymour Grady. They stood before the chancel rail during a lengthy, plain, common-sense talk from the bishop.

Mr. Candler spoke at great length, pointing out the temptations and narrow ways that would be met by the young men in their journey through life. He spoke of the Gospel, and went with them into the Scriptures, and there picked out examples that they might well aim to follow.

Bishop Candler was constantly interrupted by hearty "Amens" among the elder brethren, who seemed to appreciate his pungent and pointed remarks as much as the candidates for the church orders to whom they were directed.

Bishop Candler put the deacons through the catechism of questions provided by the church. The ceremony occupied most of the morning, and there was time for little other business. The committees of the conference are busy with their reports and most of them will be ready for taking steps before it is too late to place in secure keeping such records as the association has a right to intrust to the custody of the church.


