ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE.

Proceedings of a Largely Attended Semi-Monthly Meeting.

The semi-monthly meeting of the Anti-Saloon League of the District of Columbia held last evening in its hall at 623 Louisiana avenue was preceded by a largely attended meeting of its executive committee.

At both meetings President Erwin was in the chair and Mr. R. E. Harvey acted as secretary. Others present at the meeting of the executive committee were Mrs. Clinton Smith, Mrs. Lizzie J. Allen, Rev. Walter H. Brooks, D.D.; Albert S. Blackford, Wilber F. McDaniel, John E. Shoemaker, Col. John F. Vinal, Jesse C. Suter, Donald K. Sargent and Herman C. Metcalf. A communication was received from Owen P. Kelly who had been selected as chairman of the committee of arrangements for the fifth annual revival, asking to be excused from serving in that capacity, but offering to serve as a member of the committee. Thereupon, Herman C. Metcalf, chairman of the standing committee on mass meetings, was chosen chairman of the special committee and consented to serve for the present at least, promising to nominate the committee at the next executive meeting, which is to be held at the office of the president, Monday, July 23, at 4:15 p.m. The executive committee also had under consideration a proposed amendment of the constitution of the league, but did not reach a conclusion.

At the league meeting, after prayer by Dr. Richardson and reports from the officers, President Erwin in behalf of the committee on co-operation, Mr. Shoemaker was called on and reported for the standing committee on protests, of which he is chairman, and also as the attorney of the league. No licenses have been granted since the amendment of the league, but the one application then pending is still on file on the one member of the excise board, who has rejected it so far as he is concerned, and applied for new licenses have kept the committee busy.

Affiliated bodies represented at the meeting of the league were Calvary Baptist Church, St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, and Christian Endeavor Society, First Congregational Church, Temperance Society, Young Men's Christian Association, Eastern Presbyterian Church and Christian Endeavor Society, Columbia, Independent, Methodist and Silver Star Lodge, and the District Juvenile temples, Independent Order of Grand Templars; Northwest Women's Christian Temperance Union and the Federation of Young People's Societies of Liberal Churches.

The next meeting of the league is to be held at the same place Monday, August 6, at 8 p.m.

CENTRAL LABOR UNION.

Help Requested for the New York Striking Cigar Makers.

Vice President Rutigan presided at the meeting last evening of the Central Labor Union, President Seagey being absent on account of the death of a near relative.

A communication was read from Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, reciting an appeal from the A. F. of L. in behalf of the 7,000 cigar makers of New York, who have been on strike for more than seventeen weeks. The communication states that the strike was forced on the men because they were tyrannized over and attempts made to force them into subject conditions of labor. The tenement house and sweatshop system prevailed, and children were also employed at the work. The cigar makers are, the letter states, engaged in a great struggle to obtain decent conditions, and in spite of the combination of all the employers, are maintaining a splendid spirit of struggle in defense of their rights and in the hope that they will be able to enjoy a life more fitting to American manhood and American work.

The attention of the Central Labor Union was called to the fact that an order has been issued by Dr. Richardson, superintendent of St. Elizabeth's Asylum, requiring the nurses at that institution to thoroughly rinse all unusually or offensively soiled articles used by patients and their care before sending them to the laundry, and a committee was appointed to call on Dr. Richardson and ask him to revoke the order. It was stated that there are abundant facilities at the asylum for washing articles used by the patients without imposing the duty stated in the order referred to upon the attendants.

The steamfitters reported the status of their strike, and requested that a special committee of the Central Labor Union be appointed to co-operate with them in their efforts to secure an adjustment of the present difficulties. The request was granted.

Credentials were favorably reported from the steamfitters and helpers, bakers and confectioners, plumbers and gasfitters, and a committee was appointed to call on the Building Trades Council.
