The Navy Department has sent orders to Rear Admiral Kempff, acting commander of the Asiatic station, to send home the gunboats Concord, Marietta and Castine during the latter part of the coming summer. This is in pursuance of the policy announced some time ago of reducing the naval strength in the east. The Bennington, Petrel, Oregon and Brutus have already been ordered home, so that with these three ships there is a total reduction of the fleet in Asiatic waters to about forty-two vessels.
