Gov. McSweeney's Action in Tillman-McLaurin Resignations.

ACRIMONIOUS CAMPAIGN AVERTED

McLaurin May Now Abandon the New Party Movement.

THE GOVERNOR'S LETTER

COLUMBIA, S. C., June 1.—The action of Governor McSweeney in declining to accept the resignations of the two South Carolina senators meets the approval of all factions, and has relieved a very embarrassing situation. There seems to be no doubt that both senators will adopt the governor's suggestion and withdraw their resignations.

Gov. McSweeney reached his desk yesterday morning, returning from the dedication exercises at Chickamauga. He found more than fifty letters from politicians throughout the state urging him to decline to accept the resignations.

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MORE FAVORABLE NEWS

BULLETIN ISSUED TODAY AS TO MRS. MCKINLEY'S CONDITION.

The President, Feeling More Satisfied, Went Out for a Stroll in the Grounds.

The bulletin as to Mrs. McKinley's condition this morning was more favorable than any issued since her return from San Francisco. The three physicians did not hold a long consultation and appeared to be satisfied with the outlook. Immediately after their departure, at 11 o'clock, Secretary Cortelyou issued the following bulletin:

"Mrs. McKinley's physicians report that she rested well during the night and that her condition is somewhat more favorable this morning."

The President himself appeared to feel more satisfied and went out for a short stroll, joining General Gillespie, chief of engineers, at the west entrance to the White House and walking with him around the grounds.

The Early Report. Prior to the bulletin reports gave Mrs. McKinley's condition as worse and represented her as having passed a bad night. Some coloring was given to this when the President sent word to several callers who were seated in his office waiting for him that he would not be able to see them today.

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AT THE WHITE HOUSE

Cuban Question Discussed With Secretary Root.

ANSWER TO THE CONVENTION READ

No Change to Be Made in Philippine Situation.

COMMISSIONS SIGNED

The Cuban and Philippine problems are such that the President is compelled to give attention to them, and during the morning he had a conference with Secretary Root and Senator Foraker on these matters.

The President and Secretary Root discussed the answer for some time, their purpose being to give the Cubans no offense, but at the same time to give them to understand that this country cannot consent to having its laws interpreted by others.

The Platt amendment is put before Cuba as a law which is unchangeable by the President or any other authority than Congress itself.

Secretary Root's Attitude. Although Secretary Root will not talk for publication at this time respecting the Cuban complications, it is said that he adheres to a firm and unyielding policy with respect to the relations which should exist between the United States and Cuba.

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RIGHTS OF FILIPINOS
