HIS COURSE CLOSED.

Chief Justice Bingham to Go Abroad—Vacations of Other Judges.

The sessions of Circuit Court No. 1 have been concluded for the term. Hearings therein will not be resumed until next October. Chief Justice Bingham of the District of Columbia, who presides in Circuit Court No. 1, will sail for Europe next Wednesday.

The graduation of the other judges will not begin until the first of July. With the exception of two weeks, each member of the court will be away from the bench from June until the first of July. There will be a judge on duty each secular day during the summer months, the members of the court taking turns at such service.

The understanding is that very little will be done in the way of jury trials, except in Criminal Court No. 1, during the present month, as the majority of the judges are to give attention to proposed amendments, intended to be submitted to Congress for the District of Columbia.
