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BELEIVED TO BE INSANE. Peculiar Conduct Ascribed to Joseph Krabling, a Baker.

Joseph Krabling, a baker, thirty-eight years old, whose home is at 314 1/2 street southeast, was locked up at the fifth police station last night on the charge made that he was insane.

He caused considerable excitement in the neighborhood of his home about 11 o'clock last night by threatening to throw his five-year-old boy from the window.

Following the boy's death, which he expected would result, the father said he intended to put on his last night. Last night he stripped the boy and himself of clothing and both were naked when they appeared at the front window on the second floor.

That he did not drop the lad from the window was probably due to the diplomacy of Capt. F. E. Cross of the police department.

After some persuasion Krabling admitted the police official to the house and the latter induced him to put on his clothes. The conversation of the baker indicated that he was laboring under religious excitement. He told of conversations he claimed to have had with his Maker and expressed a desire to be permitted to interview President McKinley.

It was his belief, he said, that he had been selected to be the successor of his young son, to whom he had been much attached, should accompany him.

Krabling's peculiar religious views attracted the attention of his neighbors, and he recently entered suit against a brother, alleging some grievance, which was afterwards withdrawn. The Lord, he declared, had lighted the matter and fully forgiven him.

Only a few days ago he filled the lamps in his house with gasoline, causing the fear on the part of his relatives that a serious would result. Yesterday a brother of Krabling called on Deputy Sanitary Officer Phillips and requested him to have the supposed insane man sent to the asylum. He was given the necessary blanks to have filled out, but he failed to get them ready in time for the removal yesterday afternoon. The papers were made out this morning, and the case may be heard in court tomorrow.

CORONER TO HOLD INQUEST

INQUIRY INTO CIRCUMSTANCES OF CHARLES MUSSON'S DEATH.

Boy Graped Live Electric Wire and Was Instantly Killed - and Buried Tomorrow.

An inquest will be held tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock at the Georgetown mortuary to determine the cause of the death of Charles P. Musson, the eleven-year-old son of Mr. Poynton W. Musson, a letter carrier of the Georgetown post office. The boy was electrocuted yesterday morning about 10:45 o'clock, as stated in The Star, at the home of his grandfather, Mr. Mace Kenny of Harlem, a suburb to the west of Georgetown.

In company with his sister and parents and some other children, he had visited the home of his grandfather yesterday for a day of pleasure. In the forenoon the children were enjoying themselves, and young Musson climbed a mulberry tree to pick some of the fruit. His little sister was on the ground catching the berries as they were thrown down to her. The tracks of the Great Falls railroad run close to the tree, and alongside of the tree is a high elevation, runs a feed wire, which is nearly all the time heavily charged with electricity. In some manner the boy came in contact with the wire and he was instantly killed. His little sister on the ground wondered why no more berries were thrown down and called to her brother several times. She received no response. She gave the alarm and the body of the lad was carried down. At first it was thought he was suffering from a sunstroke, but the truth was soon realized.

Across the forehead of the body was a broad stroke, and his hands were swollen considerably. It is supposed that his forehead came in contact with the wire, and he received a severe shock. The body was full voltage passing through his body. The wire was supposed to be insulated, but the constant friction of the limbs of the tree against the wire caused the insulation to have worn off the insulation. The matter is being investigated today and the facts will be brought out at the inquest tomorrow.

Word of the fatal accident did not reach the Georgetown police station until late in the afternoon. It then came from another section of the city. Sergeant M. Hess was sent out to investigate, and made a report several hours later. In the meantime the coroner has issued a permit to bring the body to the home of the child's parents, at 3401 O street, from which place the inquest will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The winds on the south Atlantic coast will be brisk east to southeast, probably becoming high tonight. On the middle Atlantic and New England coasts fresh to brisk northeast to east winds are indicated. The winds on the lower lakes will be variable tonight, possibly becoming northeasterly Friday.

Storm warnings are displayed from Fort Mifflin to the Delaware River. Steamers which depart today for European ports will have increasing winds, mostly from easterly, and partly cloudy weather to the Great Lakes. JUDGE SIGNS THE ORDER.

Enjoins Defendants From Playing Croquet on Certain Lots. Justice Bradley, in Equity Court No. 2, has signed the formal order in the case of William J. Marsh and wife against James O. Agers and others. The order provides that the defendants be perpetually enjoined from playing the game of croquet on a vacant lot opposite 1446 Huntington place at any hour or hours which may necessitate the use of lamps, or any other form of artificial light to enable the game to be played.

The bill of complaint was filed the 19th of last July. The complainants, who live at 1446 Huntington place, alleged that the comfortable enjoyment of life by them was made impossible by reason of the playing on the vacant lot across the street of croquet in the evening of nearly every secular day of the week from about 11 o'clock at night, and sometimes later than 11 o'clock at night, the playing being that being made possible by the use of torch lights.

The decree and the opinion of Justice Bradley were vindictory of Mr. Marsh's position in the matter, the justice saying that the complainants had shown no rancor or spite, but that he himself would have found the night games of croquet a nuisance.
