UNION VETERAN LEGION.

The National Encampment of the Order at Gettysburg. Special Correspondence of The Evening Star. GETTYSBURG, Pa., October 7, 1901.

Gettysburg presents a liberal display of bunting and decorations upon the streets and everybody seems good natured and enthusiastic in anticipation of the good time expected from the national encampment of the Union Veteran Legion.

A special train from Washington arrived at 2 p.m., bearing Encampment No. 111 and a few comrades from Nos. 23 and 69, as well as the Ladies' Auxiliary, No. 32, of Washington.

The citizens' committee, under the efficient chairmanship of Col. W. T. Ziegler, has been doing splendid work and special effort to make this encampment memorable both in the history of the order and of the charming little city of 2,500 souls.

Tomorrow morning will begin at 10 o'clock the business session of the National Encampment, when the reports of committees will be received, together with other business to be dispatched.

There will be a rousing camp fire held at the court house tomorrow evening at 7:30 o'clock. J. L. Williams, district attorney of Adams county and chairman of committee of reception, will deliver the address of welcome, and Wm. R. Wood, national commander, U. V. L., will respond.

At 9 o'clock in the evening there is to be given a grand ball at Xavier hall under the auspices of the Philadelphia Gettysburg committee, U. V. L. The plan further includes a reception to the visiting ladies at 8 p.m. Wednesday at the court house.

At 7:15 p.m. of Wednesday the G. A. R. band expected to escort the national commander and officers transferred from headquarters at the Eagle Hotel to Xavier hall, where the encampment will be held.
