THE FINAL SESSION

Reciprocity Convention Adjourns Without Taking Decisive Action.

COMPROMISE RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

Strong Declaration for Government Department of Commerce.

CONTEST IN COMMITTEE

With the adoption of a series of resolutions, so broad in their phrasing as not to oppose any one's opinion and sufficiently emphatic in favor of a department of commerce and industries to give them a show of character, the delegates to the reciprocity convention yesterday succeeded in settling their acute and apparently insurmountable differences. The reading of the resolutions during the afternoon session was attended with the most tense interest and followed by manifestations of enthusiasm. They were finally adopted with but two dissenting votes, the opposition coming entirely from the American Free Trade League. When the convention had thus agreed on the form of its manifesto to the country, and a session had been held out of deference to its members, particularly interested in the Canadian trade, it adjourned at 11 o'clock, twenty-four hours earlier than anticipated by its committee of arrangements.

To the declaration in favor of the department of commerce and industries there was apparently no opposition. Many of the papers read on the correlated subject of reciprocity, and at least half the resolutions offered to the committee on resolutions, had referred favorably to the proposed new executive department. It was early made manifest that on this subject there was no inseparably associated with their cause, the reciprocity delegates desired to take formal and earnest action. Accordingly a decisive resolution, without dissent, was adopted setting forth that "the present and increasing magnitude of the aggregate manufacturing and commercial interests of the United States have become far too great to be adequately handled by and of the existing government departments," and that as "changing phases of these great interests are constantly bringing new and important questions, the proper determination of which would require all the work of a department fully organized and equipped; therefore, "this convention recommends and requests of Congress that a new department be created, to be called 'The Department of Commerce and Industries,' the head of which shall be a member of the President's cabinet; and that a reciprocity commission be created as a bureau of this new department."

Need for Compromise. But the story of the declaration for reciprocity is not so simple. The adoption of any resolutions without the most bitter fight in open convention is due, it is said, only to the adroitness and superior judgment of the committee from which the resolutions were reported. As indicated in yesterday's Star the report of this committee was awaited at yesterday morning with apprehension. It was known that the textile workers and the jewelry makers would not consent to any declaration which even suggested a tariff on imported goods. Mrs. M. A. Birdall, Watkins, N. How this was controlled by the committee was made clear from the text of the resolutions, which was in terms declared: "The growth of manufactures in the United States, represented in value and in round numbers, has been as follows: 1850.....\$1,000,000,000 1860.....2,000,000,000 1870.....3,000,000,000 1880.....4,000,000,000 1890.....5,000,000,000

"And whereas these figures exhibit at the same time a splendid result for the past industrial policies of our government, and (2) growing need for the development of larger markets in foreign countries; and as it would seem desirable not only to maintain policies under which such splendid results have been accomplished, but also devise means to develop increased markets for the increased and increasing manufactured products; therefore, this convention recommends the maintenance of the principle of protection for the home market and to open up by reciprocity opportunities for increased foreign trade by special modification of the tariff in special cases, but only where it can be done without injury to any of our home interests of manufacturing, commerce or farming.

"(2) That in order to ascertain the influence of any proposed treaty on our home interests, this convention recommends to Congress the establishment of a reciprocity commission, which shall be charged with the duty of investigating the condition of any industry and reporting to the same to the executive and to Congress for guidance in negotiating reciprocal trade agreements.

Import of Resolutions. In the eyes of the delegates these resolutions had the following import: That the convention declared for such reciprocity as did not involve the product of any factory represented on the floor of the convention; that the convention did not declare against the Kassar treaties; that the convention was opposed to any reciprocity not compatible with the republican conception of a protective tariff.

The scope of the resolution was designed as a confirmation of the appointment and services of Mr. Kassar by recommending the continuation of his work along lines of investigation already set on foot. It was the committee debated with some warmth a proposition to insert the word "serious" in the first resolution, so that the convention would have declared for reciprocity where it could have been obtained "without serious injury to any of our home interests." But the determined front of Messrs. Horner Clark and Titus Sheard, as they had spoken for the textile operators, arose before the committee and the word was omitted.

Two Notable Papers. The closing sessions included two earnest addresses, one on each side of the question. In the afternoon Mr. James Deering of the Pennsylvania Manufacturing Association spoke in reply to the earlier paper of Mr. Sheard. Point by point he developed the whole theory of reciprocity, then explained the embarrassment encountered by the American trader in dealing with France, for example, as the only importer who got it, and the result of the tariff finally amplified and applied President McKinley's Buffalo speech with manifest effect on the delegate body.

Closing Session. The order for final adjournment came at the close of the evening session. The subject of Canadian trade was considered from the standpoint of the reciprocity men only, and was not acted upon. The speakers were George P. Coppins, for the Boston chamber of commerce; John Charlton, a member of the Canadian parliament, and William Irvine of Chippewa Falls, Wis.

DEPENDS NOW ON ALBAN.

When the Insurgents Will Control the Isthmus. The news of the attack on Colon came to the Colombian legation here late in the afternoon in the following cablegram from Gen. Arjona, acting governor of Panama, in the absence of Gen. Alban, who is leading the Chorro expedition: "PANAMA, November 20. "Colon is being attacked. Scarcity of troops here. Traffic may be interrupted." While the above dispatch did not state that the city had fallen Mr. Herran, the Colombian charge d'affaires here, credits, of course, the news to that effect that came through diplomatic and naval channels. When asked as to what results may be expected from the capture of the city, Mr. Herran said: "It will depend entirely upon the success or failure of the expedition under Gen. Alban, which is headed for Chorroa to engage the insurgents at that point. If Gen. Alban is successful and the capture of Colon should be a comparatively easy matter. But if, on the other hand, the government expedition should be defeated, the results undoubtedly would be disastrous, for the insurgents then would have, temporarily at least, undisputed sway over the entire Isthmus.

Mr. Herran naturally was considerably concerned at the news, especially because of the close proximity of Colon to Panama, the leading city on the Isthmus and second only in importance to Bogota. He is not aware of the purposes of Gen. Diego A. de Castro, who arrived in New York Tuesday and who was reported to be on his way to Washington for a conference with the Colombian officials here. Gen. Castro is known to be a staunch friend of the deposed president, San Clemente.
