## FREIGHT HANDLERS' STRIKE.

Cars Tied Up at New Haven Yards Again Today.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., November 22.—The freight handlers employed in the local yards of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company remain out on strike today, and hundreds of cars are tied up here, although the railroad managers say the situation is slowly improving, and express the belief that the congestion will be relieved during the day. Men from Boston, Philadelphia and other points are on their way here to take the places of the strikers. At the request of the railroad company police details were sent to the yards today to guard the property of the company.

At the railroad office it was stated that two trains had come from Harlem river, and one freight had been made up here and started for Boston. Three engines and shifting cranes were said to be working in the yards.

The men in the yards at Meriden who went out yesterday have returned to work. The only strike along the company's lines in Connecticut, outside of New Haven, is said to be at Westfield, where a few men quit work last night.

NEW YORK, November 22.—There were no developments over night in the matter of the strike of New York, New Haven

## and Hartford switchmen. The railway officials claimed that they had ten switch engines, each man with a full crew of five men, at work, and that two full freight trains had been dispatched to eastern points during the morning.

Division Superintendent Shepard said that everything looks favorable for an early settlement of the strike, and that over half of the regular force of men were at work in the Harlem river yards.

It was said that thirty men had been sent to New Haven to take the places of the strikers there, and that new men were being brought to this city from eastern Pennsylvania, New Jersey and northern New York.

John Ludrigan, deputy commissioner of labor, and Bernard Stabile, of the state board of mediator, are using their good offices to bring the strike to an end. They conferred with Superintendent Shepard today and then called on the strike leaders, Mr. Ludrigan said Mr. Shepard had given him a couple of propositions to submit to the strikers, but would not say what they were.

## IMPORTANT RAILROAD CASE.

Decided by the Supreme Court of Minnesota. ST. PAUL, Minn., November 22.—The supreme court today reversed the Hennepin county district court in an important case, the lower court having directed a verdict in favor of the Great Northern railway after the jury had awarded \$7,500 damages against that road for serious injuries inflicted on young Camille Marengo in the Minneapolis yards. The supreme court held that the failure of the railroad to construct required fences makes it liable for damages for injuries which may be received for such failure.

## No Warrant for Extravagance.

Former Teller of Bank of Williamsburg, N. Y.

NEW YORK, November 22.—Kings county grand jury returned an indictment today against George Zollinhofer, the teller of the Williamsburg Savings Bank, who confessed that he and a fellow employee robbed the institution of \$30,000. The indictment charged four counts of grand larceny. Counsel for Zollinhofer asked and was granted for his client until next Wednesday to plead.
