NEW PENSION RULES Formulated for Presentation of Private Bills. ACTION OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE Method of Procedure Which Must Be Followed. ACTS NOT ADMISSIBLE

"For many years," said Chairman Loudenlager to a Star reporter today, "no rules obtained in the committee on pensions for private pension bills. The committee was called together and just as it happened to feel good, granted pensions. At one time it would grant \$20 to a claimant and at the next meeting grant a man \$15 or \$18 who, perhaps, had a more meritorious case."

Method of Procedure. "To secure the consideration of a bill for pension, or increase of pension, a carefully prepared petition should be addressed to the Congress of the United States, setting forth the applicant's post office address, his age, and the proper designation of the military organization to which he belonged, or the names of all naval vessels on which he served, and the length of his service."

Rating for Pensions. "The rating for pension or increase of pension to widows of officers will be graded according to rank, as indicated in the following statement: 'For major general and brigadier general in the army and commodore and rear admiral in the navy, not exceeding \$50 per month.'"

To Restore Widow Pension. "Consideration will not be given to any bill to restore to the pension roll the name of a widow whose pension was forfeited by remarriage. In order to afford relief to this class of widows Congress passed an act, which was approved March 3, 1901, amending section 4708 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, so as to read as follows: 'The remarriage of any widow, dependent mother, or dependent sister, entitles her pension shall not bar her right to such pension to the date of her remarriage, whether an application therefor was filed before or after such marriage; but in the event of remarriage of any widow, dependent mother or dependent sister having a pension, such application shall be subject to the review of any officer or enlisted man in the army or navy, or marine corps of the United States, during the life of his service, upon any war, and whose name was placed or shall hereafter be placed on the pension roll before the death of the husband of said widow, or injury received or disease contracted in such military or naval service, and whose name has been or shall hereafter be placed on the pension roll by reason of her marriage to another person who has since died or shall hereafter die, or from whom she has been hereafter divorced, or from whom she has been hereafter separated, and who has not been remarried, and who is without means of support, and who is under the age of sixteen years, she shall not be entitled to restoration under this act unless said husband or

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


WHITNEY IMPLICATES DEVERLY. Damaging Testimony Given by Private Detective Regarding "Protection." Edgar A. Whitney, the private detective formerly in the employ of the Parkhurst Society, who made a confession of "dealings" with Police Warden Glenmon, now on trial for neglect of duty in New York, was committed to the Tombs yesterday at the request of District Attorney

PHILIP. Whitney had informed Assistant District Attorney Garvan that he would not corroborate the "confession" made by him in so far as it related to Glenmon. He was immediately taken before Justice Termon, who committed him to the Tombs in default of \$10,000 bail. Later in the afternoon Whitney reconsidered his refusal and went on the stand. He gave damaging testimony as to the arrangement made with him by Glenmon for the "protection" of certain houses. He told how he had arranged the matter and was "tipped off" the police stations when a raid was to be made. Once he said, he called up police headquarters by telephone when a raid was to be made, and was answered by Deputy Police Commissioner Devery. Counsel asked: "What happened then?" "I was connected with the West 36th street (the Tenderloin) station," was the reply. A night session of the court was held, during which Glenmon went on the stand in his own behalf.
