LIVELY SOCIAL EVENT

It Ended in the Police Court Today With Jail Sentences. THE DAY AFTER CHRISTMAS.

FUNERAL OF MAJ. BELKNAP

WILL BE INTERRED BESIDE HIS FATHER'S GRAVE. Ceremonies to be held at Arlington—Career in Congress and the Army.

The body of the late Major Hugh R. Belknap, paymaster, U. S. A., will arrive in Washington tomorrow by the Pennsylvania railroad from the west at 1:15 p.m. The funeral party will be met by a squad of cavalry from Fort Myer, and the body will be taken direct from the train to Arlington cemetery for interment beside Major Belknap's father, Gen. Belknap, the former Secretary of War. There appropriate religious and military ceremonies will follow. Mrs. Meta Belknap, widow of Major Belknap, and Cadet George H. Steele, jr., of the navy, her brother, accompanied the remains from the Philippines and were joined at Marlon, Ind., by Representative and Mrs. George W. Steele and other members of the family. The honorary pallbearers will be the following named officers of the pay department: Col. C. S. Sniffen, Lieut. Col. Geo. W. Baird, Major Webster Vinson and Capt. Otto Becker. Major Belknap had many friends in this city, and it is probable that his funeral will be largely attended.

Major Belknap died at Clamabang, Luzon, November 12, only three weeks after his arrival in the Philippines, a letter received from Colonel W. Halford of the pay corps, secretary to the President during the Harrison administration, who was at Washington and Keokuk, Mo., in 1878, stated that he left Manila in apparently good health on November 10, was seized with an attack of appendicitis on the following day, and died on the 12th after an operation which revealed a hopeless condition of gangrene of the intestines.

Major Belknap spent his boyhood days at Washington and Keokuk, Mo., in 1878, Phillips-Exeter Academy to enter the employ of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad at Baltimore in 1879. He attained the position of chief clerk of the general manager of that system, leaving to become superintendent of the Alley L road in Chicago, the affairs of which he managed for several years.

Major Belknap was re-elected in 1896. During his four years in Congress he became one of the most popular of the younger members of the House.

In 1897 he was married to Miss Meta V. Steele, daughter of Representative Steele of Marlon, Ind. Upon his retirement from the House he was appointed a paymaster in the volunteer army, at the solicitation of members of the Illinois delegation. He made an excellent record in this and the two volunteer officers appointed major and paymaster in the regular establishment by President McKinley under the army reorganization act.

He was stationed at Chicago, and later at San Francisco. In October he sailed, in company with his wife, for Manila. He visited Washington friends immediately after leaving, and was complimented by them on his seemingly excellent condition of health.

Mrs. Belknap, when he died, stated that he left Manila in apparently good health on November 10, was seized with an attack of appendicitis on the following day, and died on the 12th after an operation which revealed a hopeless condition of gangrene of the intestines.

Funeral of Capt. H. L. Draper

The funeral of Capt. Herbert L. Draper of the marine corps, who died September 19 last at Hong Kong, will take place tomorrow afternoon at the Naval Academy, Annapolis, at 8 o'clock. The remains were brought back to New York recently on the McClellan and have been taken to Annapolis.
