URGENT DEFICIENCY BILL

REPORTED TO THE SENATE BY SENATOR HALE

THE COUNTRY BEHIND THE BILL.

GENERAL WOOD'S LETTER TO MEMBERS OF THE SENATE.

Without Duties on Cuban Sugar Cut One Third There Will be a Profit in Production of Only 48 Cents.

A circular letter, which emphasizes the President's views on Cuba and which is signed by Gen. Leonard Wood, has been sent to the members of the Senate. The letter, which follows, urges immediate action in the way of tariff reduction:

HEADQUARTERS Military Government of Cuba, Havana, January 30, 1902.

MY DEAR SIR: I desire to invite your most earnest attention and consideration to the economic conditions existing in Cuba under conditions which threaten to bring ruin to her principal industries, sugar and tobacco, unless a radical relief is given.

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
