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NEWS OF PHILIPPINES

NATIVE CREW OF STEAMER IN A MUTINY. Army Officers Recommend the Reduction of the Forts at Bacolod, Mindanao.

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A dispatch from Manila yesterday says: The native crew of the interinsular steamer, His Hermanos, mutinied, last Thursday, Island of Catanduanes, at Port Virac. They murdered the chief engineer of the vessel and wounded the captain, the mate, the second engineer and one of the passengers, all of whom are Spaniards. Numbers of the native consular went to the rescue of the ship's officers. They fired into the crew and killed three of them.

NATIVE CREW OF STEAMER IN A MUTINY.

The Moro situation in Mindanao is considered critical. It is believed that American troops will soon move against Bacolod, where the recent murder of two members of the 27th Infantry was plotted. A small party of Moros surprised an outpost of the 27th Camp Vicars, Mindanao, August 12, and succeeded in killing two and wounding one American before they were driven off. They were from Bacolod, which has a strong fort and other defenses. Bitter opposition to the Moro situation is shown at Bacolod, and Captain John J. Pershing of the 15th Cavalry, commanding the American forces at Lake Lanao, has recommended the reduction of the Moro situation.

NATIVE CREW OF STEAMER IN A MUTINY.

General Chaffee, who left Manila August 12 on a final tour of the southern islands, reached Zamboanga, Island of Mindanao, last Friday. He will confer with the local commander-in-chief, General Chaffee, who is in command of the forces moved decisively against the hostiles they would lose the support of the friendly Moros.

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
