HEARING THE CLOSE Prayers for Instructions in Nelson Trial Today. REBUTTAL TESTIMONY ATTORNEYS CLASH AT INTERVALS OVER QUESTIONS ASKED.

Prayers for instructions to the jury and final arguments engaged the attention of the court in the Alexandria county court today in the trial of John Nelson for burning a frame building owned by Frank Foster and Charles E. Sanderson in Jackson City the night of July 14. The knowledge that the concluding efforts of attorneys would be made today attracted an unusually large number to the court room.

Evidence in Rebuttal. Shortly past 9 o'clock this morning Judge Love took his seat in the Alexandria county court and the trial was resumed.

The first witness called was William J. Smith, the driver of the Jackson City bus, who testified originally to having conveyed the defendant across the Long bridge from Washington just before the fire occurred.

The hearing of testimony was then resumed. Sidney Wiley, a fire alarm operator, whose home is at 213 1/2 E street north-west, testified that he was on duty the night of the fire, and received a telephone message at 10:50 o'clock from a Pennsylvania railroad employee.
