OUTPUT OF CANNED TOMATOES AT POTOMAC FACTORIES. Missing Buoy Located—Power Launch Alma About Ready for Service—General News.

Estimates which have been recently compiled show that the canning factories in the northern neck of Virginia during the last season put up 136,200 cases of tomatoes, nearly half the output of the canning factories in the states of Virginia and West Virginia.

There was an excellent demand for fish at the wholesale fish market at the wharf this morning, the supply being quite scarce, most of the catch coming from southern waters.
