Conditions at Industrial Home School Called to Attention. Captain C. M. Chester, superintendent of the United States naval observatory, has written to the District Commissioners calling attention to the sewerage arrangements at the Industrial Home School, and asking that steps be taken to better the conditions there.

RECORD AGAIN BROKEN. Largest Issue of Patents Recorded at Any One Time. The largest issue of patents ever recorded at any one time in the history of the United States patent office was granted yesterday, the total number of patents and designs issued being 738, of which number 644 were to citizens of the United States and 92 to citizens of foreign countries.

Official of the patent office state that the issue thus far for 1903 has been considerably larger than for the corresponding months of 1902. In April of last year there were 2,718 patents granted by the office, and in the month of April of this year 3,144 patents were granted. In the allowed files of the office for the month of April, with the elimination of the patents which were cancelled because of non-payment of final fees, the number of cases awaiting final payment of fees increased 1,588.

The notable increase in applications for patents and also in the number issued is the result of the increased activity in the increased industry and thrift of the inventors of labor-saving devices. According to those who should be conversant with the matter, the average inventor is usually lacking in the proper knowledge of the general principles of the patent law, and they are usually willing to pay large amounts of money to secure the services of a patent lawyer.

The patent office is said to be an indicator of the business condition of the country, and as such a keen student of the general condition of the general prosperity and healthy business condition of the United States.
