THE NATIONAL GUARD

Program Arranged for Annual Rifle Competitions.

SCHEDULE OF EVENTS

INSTRUCTIONS COVERING THE SHERMAN STATUE PARADE.

Appointments, Promotions and Changes That Occurred During Past Quarter—Property Condemned.

The annual rifle competitions at the Ordway range will occur Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, the 20th, 21st, 22nd and 23rd instants. Subject to the approval of headquarters, the matches will be shot in accordance with the following schedule:

Monday, October 20—The merchants' match, the company, battalion and regimental team matches, the beginners' match, the novice match and the tyro company team match.
 Tuesday, October 21—The Evening Star match, the Washington match, the R. Harris & Co. trophy match and the senatorial trophy match.
 Wednesday, October 22—The members' match, the Gerstenberg trophy match, the skirmish team match and the revolver matches.
 Thursday, October 23—The Harries long range match and the distinguished marksmen's match.

The program of competitions is substantially the same as that of a year ago. The May match has been eliminated and a tyro company team match and a novice match have been added. The two additions are intended to increase the interest in "military" rifle men in the meeting and in rifle shooting. A new revolver match will be open to a team of five men from each battalion. Each battalion will fire one shot at a deliberate aim and ten shots "rapid fire." As the commissioned officers of the brigade are now provided with modern revolvers it is anticipated that more interest will be manifested in the revolver competitions than ever before.

The shooting will begin promptly at 9 o'clock each morning of the meet. The Ordway range will be available Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays after 1 o'clock p. m. for the completion of official scores. As all reports for the rifle practice season now closing must reach the inspector general of rifle practice not later than November 5, it is pointed out that only a brief period remains for the completion of scores.

Sherman Statue Parade.
 Adjt. Gen. Brett has issued the following circular:

"This office has been informed that the National Guard of the District will be paraded October 15, for the unveiling of the Sherman statue, the order for which will be issued later.
 The blue uniform, including caps, white gloves, white collars, leggings and black shoes will be worn. The trousers will be gaiters instead of white gloves. The naval battalion will appear in its prescribed uniform.
 Dismounted officers will not wear leggings. Mounted officers will wear black boots.
 Commanding officers of organizations will at once notify the officers and men of their commands of the intended parade, in order that the same may present the best possible appearance.
 The shoes will be neatly polished, and the portion of the white collar showing above the collar of the coat will be as nearly uniform throughout the command as possible. To accomplish this a standing order of medical inspection will be issued. Battalions will be carefully inspected by their commanders before regiments are formed.

Opening of Athletic Season.
 Arrangements have been completed for the opening of the National Guard gymnasium next Tuesday evening. The board of control of the athletic association announces that all membership cards issued before July 1, 1903 are canceled; that only officers and regularly enlisted men of the National Guard of the District of Columbia are eligible to membership; that application for membership cards, in writing, should be made in full, rank, organization and endorsed by immediate commanding officers, made to the physical director, who will, through the custodian in charge of gymnasium or the physical director, and that members will be permitted to use the gymnasium only on nights assigned by the custodian or physical director.
 Members of the association using the gymnasium must enter as individuals.
 Only members of the athletic association who were enlisted prior to December 31 of the year preceding any games held under the auspices of this association are eligible to enter.
 Physical Director Joseph Horan announces that he will present a gold medal to the member of the association making the best percentage in attendance and improvement in apparatus work during the coming season.
 The following schedule has been adopted: Tuesday and Thursday, 8 to 10 a. m., classes; Monday, Wednesday and Friday, 7:30 to 10:30 p. m., basket and base ball. No team will be permitted to use the gymnasium for more than one hour if there is more than one applicant.
 No person will be allowed on the floor of the gymnasium who is not in gymnasium attire.
