### Supervising Principal

Mr. F. L. Cardozo Chosen by Board of Education.

At a meeting of the board of education yesterday afternoon Mr. F. L. Cardozo, principal of Stevens schools, was unanimously elected supervising principal of the new division of the public schools. Mr. Cardozo is thirty-four years of age, is married and is a member and vestryman of St. Luke's P. E. Church and ex-president of the Bethel Literary Society. He is a son of the late Prof. F. L. Cardozo, a former principal of the Colored High School of this city. He received his education in the public schools of the District of Columbia, Spencerville Business College, and at various summer schools, and has been teaching in the county and city schools here since 1880. He was formerly associated with Mr. Raymond Rior-don in vacation school work, and is at present assistant director of night schools and principal of Stevens School, one of the largest schools in the District of Columbia, the other being the Jefferson School.

Mr. Cardozo's best testimony to Mr. Cardozo's work in the schools has been made by Mr. J. R. Keene, supervising principal of the seventh division, who says: "This year's graduates from the Almer Normal School, Mr. Cardozo began teaching the first grade in my division in September, 1890, and was soon and by promotion, promoted, finally becoming teacher of the eighth grade and principal of Wilson School in October, 1896. Last of Conferences of Convention of Swedenborgians.
