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ARRIVE TOMORROW

ARRANGEMENTS FOR ENTERTAINING VISITING FILIPINOS.

Will Be Given Reception by the District Commissioners at the Corcoran Art Gallery.

Commissioner Macfarland was informed today of the arrangements that have been made by the Board of Trade and the Business Men's Association for the District's participation in the entertainment of the Filipino commissioners, pursuant to the request of the Secretary of War, transmitted through the Commission, and expressed gratification with the response made by those organizations.

Under the program adopted the Business Men's Association will meet the Filipinos with carriages upon their arrival at the 6th street station tomorrow afternoon, and will escort them to the hotel; and Monday morning they will call at the hotel and escort them back to the station. The Board of Trade will spend Saturday in showing the visitors the sights of the national capital, escorting them from place to place in automobile conveyances.

The Commissioners of the District of Columbia will formally welcome the Filipino commissioners at the Corcoran Gallery of Art, which will be opened to them for that purpose by its board of trustees at 8 o'clock tomorrow evening. Members of the Board of Trade and Business Men's Association will be present to receive the commissioners, and the entertainment of the Filipinos is the part of the District, will be present, but there will be no general reception and no general refreshments, no ladies will be present and there will be no refreshments.
