Herring played his usual game around first, getting lost in tight places, but he was not at all out of his stride, getting two singles and a double, which could have been stretched into a triple were it not for the error of the field.

Turner hit a fast grounder over second, which McCormick stopped with the glove and threw to Herring, who was in a hurry to get to first. Herring's throw was a marvelous stop and the spectators cheered the clever second baseman for several minutes.
