

PUT OFF ONCE MORE

Delay in Securing Decision in Waggaman Case.

THE ARGUMENTS HEARD

CLASH OF INTERESTS OVER PROPOSED RECEIVERSHIP.

Additional Petition in Bankruptcy Filed Today—Further Hearing Monday Morning Next.

The application of certain creditors of Mr. Thomas E. Waggaman to have him adjudged a bankrupt came up before Justice Anderson of the District Supreme Court this morning, and it was confidently expected that final action would be taken, but after an argument lasting an hour, further consideration of the case was put off until next Monday morning at 10 o'clock. This was done in order to allow some of the petitioning creditors time to file a supplementary petition or answer setting forth the written admission of Mr. Waggaman, made yesterday, that it is unable to pay his debts.

Mr. Bonaparte's Argument.

The first hour of the court was taken up with the signing of orders, not relevant to the Waggaman matter, and at 10 o'clock when Mr. Thomas E. Bonaparte of Baltimore, one of the counsel for the Catholic University of America and the Georgetown University, addressed Justice Anderson in behalf of his clients.

Attorneys for the secured creditors or the lienors, headed by Mr. Jackson H. Ralston, opposed delay strenuously. Mr. Ralston characterized the program of Mr. Bonaparte as "clever maneuvering, trifling with the court's time, and warning the court not to take any action until after the filing of the defendant's answer."
