Why there should be such a furry at this late day over Mr. Bryan's position is not clear. He has never for a moment disguised his feelings. His opposition to Judge Parker before the nomination was no less vigorous than outspoken.

It may be said with safety, too, that Mr. Bryan's opposition would leave him quite as strong if a serious attempt had been made at St. Louis to substitute either Mr. Cleveland, or Mr. Gorman, or Mr. Hill for the New York jurist.

But it did not take Mr. Bryan long after arriving in St. Louis to discover that, so far as the candidate was concerned, his fight was lost. His choice therefore was between bolting, or securing such expressions in the platform as would leave him with an excuse for supporting the ticket and a small hope for reviving his policies in the name of democracy.

Still, with Judge Parker as the candidate, and with Mr. Hill and Mr. Gorman as chief advisers, and the Belmonts and many of the trust magnates assisting in the money arrangements of the campaign, how can Mr. Bryan be expected to speak with undiluted enthusiasm for the ticket? It would be disastrous to him and unprofitable to the party for him to eat his words by turning eulogist and decorating Judge Parker with the flowers of his praise.

Let there be fair play for Mr. Bryan. He sails under some pretty dangerous colors, but under none that may be called false.
