INAUGURATION DAY WEATHER.

Bureau Officials Unable to Make Prediction Today.

"What kind of weather will we have March 4? This anxious inquiry was fired at the official forecaster of the weather bureau many times today, by reason of which the 'tinkling' of the telephone bell in Prof. Garriott's office was almost incessant. It was an indication, the weather officials said, that the people of Washington are fearful that the fickle goddess of meteorology will give the visiting thousands on inauguration day an unfavorable sample of March weather in Washington, such as the city experienced on several other similar occasions.

When asked the same question by a Star reporter late this afternoon Prof. Garriott said the winter of 1904 and 1905 has been one of rapid weather changes, and he added, 'it will be impossible at this time to say what the conditions will be next Saturday when President Roosevelt is to be inaugurated.'

The changes will undoubtedly be raised during the remainder of this week, but Garriott will probably be able to make a definite calculation as to what sort of weather will prevail March 4. Before that time it will be impossible to make such a prediction.

Rain is promised for tonight, with fair weather tomorrow and no decided change in the temperature.
