THE WORLD'S CHAMPIONSHIP. Johnson to Meet Winner of Fitzsimmons-O'Brien Match.

NEW YORK, November 28.—A yacht race that for number and quality of entries will surpass any race that was ever held in American waters is to take place at Newport next August for a cup presented to the New York Yacht Club by King Edward VII.

At a special meeting of the New York Yacht Club last night the offer of the King to give a challenge cup for great racing yachts of America was accepted.

The swift Atlantic, winner of the transatlantic race for the Kaiser's cup last spring, the Hildegarde, the Endymion, the Wilem, the Fleur de Lys, the Alca, the Uloanna, the Spharita, the Vigilant, the Minnie, the Yankee, the Corona, the Elmina and the Invader will in all probability race for the royal trophy. It will be known as "The King's Cup."

The presentation of the cup by King Edward VII. to the New York Yacht Club was a most important event in the history of the sport.
