**A Word for the Cat.**

To the Editor of The Star:

I am amazed at the present crusade against cats. The cat has been handed down to us from ancient times with ven-

eration. Who has not heard of Whittington and his cat, how the possession of one enabled him, coming as it did during a scourge of rats?

That great man, Dr. Samuel Johnson, personally purchased dainties for his pet cat rather than risk the annuity of his servants. Who of us but does not re- gret the affection of our parents and grandparents for these animals, and also the necessity felt by our ancestors to cherish and protect the cat, that most domestic of household pets.

It is indeed a pity that the microbe theory has been pushed to such an extent that innocent animals as well as human beings must be punished. Do we alone possess all the knowledge of the age? We dwell in the valley of the shadow of death. Were all the animals upon the earth destroyed, disease would still come and death also. It is the law of our be-

ings, have never been bitten by one, have always found them a protection in the home, as in the destruction of rats, in which particularly they are invaluable. I have known cats to daily bring rats for their young, but in many months only a single rat among the number.

A member of the household being ill in bed, a pet cat brought in a mouse and laid it down beside the invalid. This was her accustomed way of remembering the sick.

In conclusion I would say: Let us keep what God has made and given man for his protection. Let us not think that man himself has many fallings and sins of commission. Yet we bear with him. Why not exercise the same charity toward the cat? LOUISE M. KEITH.

**Court Suspended Sentence.**

Domestic troubles in the family of Charles and Ella Simms, colored, were aired in the Police Court this morning on account of the arrest yesterday of the husband for assault on his wife. Ella complained that her husband came home last Sunday night in a drunken condition and started an altercation, striking her several times in the face with his fist. She was not seriously wounded. Judge Kimball found the prisoner guilty of the assault and imposed a sentence of 30 or 60 days, but suspended sentence pending the good behavior of the husband, so that he could help support the family.
